Classroom Activities

May brings a close to your child's year at Berrybrook. For children, it brings mixed feelings - sadness at saying goodbye to friends, pride in their accomplishments, excitement about the summer and anticipation of new school experiences in the fall. At Berrybrook, teachers prepare children for this change. Children are encouraged to think about our remaining weeks so they may have time to request a favorite Berrybrook activity. Teachers choose special books like "My Teacher Said Goodbye Today" to stimulate discussion about feelings of separation. (Yes, separation is a life long issue - remember the tears the first day of school?)

Three special Berrybrook activities take place in May. The first is our **Annual Trip to Duxbury Beach.** The trip has been happening at Berrybrook for many years and the children enjoy going to the beach with their entire class.

The trip <u>for all classes</u>, will be on Tuesday, May 15, with a rain date of Friday, May 18. All parents are invited. Morning classes will meet at 9:00 am and afternoon classes will meet at 1:00 pm. Any parents who may not be able to make the trip are encouraged to make carpool arrangements for their children Teachers will supervise children whose parents cannot attend. Many more details of this trip will be sent home soon. On Tuesday, May 22, the Duxbury Community Partnerships for Children has arranged for the 4 and 5 Day afternoon classes to take a Kindergarten Bus Trip to the Chandler Elementary School in Duxbury. The 5 Day morning class will have their trip on Wednesday, May 23rd. While at Chandler, the children will walk through a kindergarten classroom, peek at the bathrooms, and see the library, nurse's office, cafeteria and playground. The goal of this visit is to help children anticipate Kindergarten positively by providing children a glimpse of what their school day will be like next fall. Parents can expect permission slips with more details to be sent home soon.

A very special Berrybrook tradition this month is the **Last Day of School Ice Cream Party.** During the last weeks of school, children make home made vanilla ice cream to share with families on their last day of school. Through the years it has proven to be a relaxed and enjoyable way to say goodbye to good friends. On Wednesday, May 30th the 3 Day class will have their ice cream party. Children will arrive as usual at 9:00. At 10:30, all parents are invited to join us on the playground.

On Friday, June 1, morning children will arrive as usual at 9:00. At 10:30, all parents are invited to join us on the playground.

The afternoon groups will arrive at 1:00 pm and their families will return to join us at 2:30 pm. The ice cream and farewells will be enjoyed until dismissal.

Berrybrook History

In 2005, The Berrybrook Board of Directors commissioned Robert Dente to research the origins and the story of the Berrybrook farmhouse. After two years of study, Mr. Dente submitted a comprehensive report to the Board listing 28 individuals in a "Chain of Title" for the house. On Wednesday evening April 11th, Mr. Dente came to Berrybrook to talk about the history of the house.

After talking about "The Second Division of the Commons of Duxbury and Pembroke in 1713", and how the original lot that the house is on was created, Mr. Dente focused in on the farmhouse itself. He has determined that the first occupants of the house were Blanie and Christian (Wadsworth) Phillips. While residing in what we know as the Berrybrook School, Blanie and Christian gave birth to 11 children - 6 boys and 5 girls.

"I believe that the house was probably started in the fall of 1732. This may only have been laying the foundation and preparing the materials needed. If Blanie was to be married in May of 1733, some forethought had to have been given to building himself a house... The goal would be for Blanie and Christian to have their house to move into when they married and set the date for May 23rd, 1733."

Based on Mr. Dente's recommendation, the Duxbury Rural Historical Society has issued a date board for the farmhouse – *Blanie Phillips c. 1733*. On the way home from the meeting I was thinking about all of the people who have lived or worked in the house that Blanie built. Mr Dente identified 28 different deeds over the last 274 years. If you think about it, Berrybrook School is relatively late on the scene. The building had already been here for 221 years before Mrs. Mann chose it for her "wonderful new preschool". The history that Mr. Dente provided put our stewardship of the house in a bigger context. The house has been through many changes and revisions since Blanie built this place for his bride. The occupants of the house made alterations and additions appropriate for their needs.

The house transformed from a residence to a school in 1954, and Mrs. Mann and others made modifications to the structure for the benefit of Berrybrook. Now, the Lucretia Prentiss Bailey Trust, created by Mrs. Mann in memory of her mother, and Berrybrook School will be making other changes and improvements as the house evolves to serve our community in new and important ways.

The Importance Of Reading Aloud To Children

Recently, I attended a lecture by Jim Trelease, the author of *THE READ-ALOUD HANDBOOK*, *HEY! LISTEN TO THIS*, and *READ ALL ABOUT IT*. He is an outstanding speaker who is trying to spread the word to all parents about the importance of reading aloud to children.

"Few children learn to love books by themselves. Someone has to lure them into the wonderful world of the written word; someone has to show them the way." (Orville Prescott, from - A Father Reads To His Children)

In his lecture, he quoted some amazing statistics on the amount of hours children spend watching television, playing video games and/or working on the computer. Competing with these electronic devices is not easy but it can be done. Parents should start reading to their children when they are still young enough to want to imitate what they are seeing and hearing. It is important to find books that will be of interest to both child and reader.

"Before a child can have an interest in reading, he must first have an awareness of it. The child who is unaware of the riches of literature certainly can have no desire for them." (Jim Trelease, from – The Read-Aloud Handbook)

Reading aloud to children is so important because it helps to develop the child's vocabulary, imagination and enthusiasm for learning new things. Even in our busy hectic lives we can find some time to sit and enjoy a good book with our children.

"If we would get our parents to read to their preschool children 15 minutes a day, we could revolutionize the schools."
