How to be a Friend

It's spring. In our classrooms, friendships are coming into full bloom. However, as children grow closer, these same friendships provide the opportunity for hurt feelings. After all, a mere acquaintance can snub you and you hardly notice. Only close friends possess the power to really hurt your feelings. To a child, having a friend sit next to someone else at circle time can be devastating. At Berrybrook, we spend a good deal of our time helping children manage these delicate relationships. Encouraging children to develop empathy for others is one of the most challenging jobs of the preschool teacher. Four and five year olds are just starting to learn that their actions can have an affect on someone else. One of the ways we help children develop empathy is by being active listeners. We model good listening and encourage them to listen to each other. When children know they will be listened to, they are more apt to listen to some one else. We suggest that they look directly at each other when they have something to say. We encourage responses that include how they feel about things. Berrybrook teachers often ask children "What could you say?" or, "What could you do?," when children are working out a problem.

When we ask children, they in fact know many ways to be kind and good to friends. Intellectually, they know the right choices, but developmentally, they are just beginning to put them into practice. It is our job to provide them with opportunities to demonstrate how kind they are and to practice being a good friend. At Berrybrook, teachers design their classrooms and curriculum to promote a sense of empathy and community, and conflicts between children are seen as opportunities for helping children become sensitive human beings.

Mrs. La Forest, Mrs. Piccuito, Mrs. Swan, Mrs. O'Neil, Mrs. Delano, Mrs. Caddle, Miss Bent, Mrs. Fosdick and Mrs. Neal respond to children with hurt feelings with compassion. They listen. They ask for details and, if necessary, they help children express themselves to their friends. Dealing will hurt feelings is a big part of our day. I have said before that Berrybrook is a wonderful school with wonderful traditions. Our tradition of creating an empathetic, respectful environment for children is our most important.

"Why I Love Being a Preschool Teacher"

One afternoon while I was preparing the day's project, one of the children asked me, "Mrs. Fosdick, why do you like being a teacher? Is it hard to be a teacher?" I, of course, answered the child with the usual, "I like being a teacher because I am able to work with children like you!" And, "No, it is not hard to be a teacher, it is fun!"

On the way home from school that day, I started to think more deeply about that child's question. I was thinking that the answer I gave the child didn't really do justice to the way I truly feel about WHY I like being a preschool teacher. Over the next couple of months, I pondered this question each day as I worked.

Since I am usually the teacher involved in the daily art projects, I started to think about that aspect of my job. Is it that I am able to paint, glue, color, stamp, draw, cut, and (my all time favorite) glitter, everyday? Is it that I am a grown adult who leaves work with paint still stuck underneath her manicured fingernails? Or is it the fun of having to explain to my husband why I have a painted green handprint on the back of my pants?

Then I started thinking about our "circle time". Do I love being a preschool teacher because I am able to sit on the floor cross-legged in a circle with a group of children and take turns talking? In what other profession can you do that? Or perhaps it is the fact that I can sing to a group of people who could care less about how awful my singing is? Is it the fact that I can "Jump Josie" and the children don't care that I am a grown up? Or is it the fact that when I read a story, I have 16 faces (usually!) looking up at me, listening to what will happen next in the story, and hanging on my every word?

What other profession enables you to spend a part of the day outdoors watching children play? I am able to go on nature walks, fly kites, sled, watch children swinging, running, climbing, jumping, and socializing with their peers. How fortunate I am!

Well, I think all of these things I have mentioned are a part of why I enjoy being a preschool teacher. But, I thought back again about the answer I gave so automatically that day. I realized I wasn't really so far off with the answer I gave. All of the things we do everyday with the children are so enjoyable because of the children, themselves! Working with the children to help them complete a project; teaching them new songs; reading them stories; helping them to attain independence; learning about each child as an individual; learning their strengths and weaknesses; watching them accomplish things that they have been working on, be them small or large; and feeling true joy to see the expression on their face when they do; these are the reasons why I love being a preschool teacher. The conversations and the interaction I have with the children are what I truly enjoy the most!

Here are a few quotes from the children that I would like to share:

"My Mom crochets because it keeps her hands from being rusty."

"Wait a minute, I'm thinking... it's....it's right here in my brain."

A conversation between three boys while working on the day's project: The first boy says to the second boy, "Oh, your hair looks so handsome today!" The second boy answers, "Yeah, my Mom combed me before I came." The third boy says, "Yeah, my Mom combs me too before I leave."

"I don't have a car; I have a "GUV"

Regarding clean up time, one girl states, "Those children are not being very responsible."

After I yawned, a child says, "Mrs. Fosdick, looks like you didn't get enough sleep last night!"

"We're getting so big, we scare ourselves....."

"Don't even think I have something in my back pocket, because I don't!"

"Oh wait, I can't think of it.....it's.....it's right here, in the bottom of my belly."

"Hi, (a boy says to one of the girls) remember, I am going to marry you today!"

"Mrs. Fosdick, the paper towels are all wasted out."

"Is baby Jesus dead, or is he in New York?"

"Mrs. Keeley, why do you build a new school every year?"

After complimenting a child on her ability to swing so high she says, "Yeah, I'm like a professional swinger."

"Mrs. Caddle, did you know that your hair is turning a little gray on the sides?"

After a conversation regarding how birds clean their feathers, a boy states, "Yeah, sometimes I lick myself."

As you can see, you never know what a preschool child is going to say, or how they are going to say it, and THIS is why I love my job!
