# Notes from the Headmaster

Tradition. So much of what happens during the holidays is tradition. What we eat, songs we sing, people and places we visit are often the same year after year. Traditions keep us connected to each other. At Berrybrook we rely on many traditions throughout the year. Last month, the 2 & 3 Day pinecone turkeys, the 4 & 5 Day Plimoth Plantation re-creations and the children's home made butter were all traditional Berrybrook activities. Over the years Berrybrook traditions have evolved with the children and the times. For example, in the past, the children made beach plum jelly every September. As the enrollment grew and beach plum bushes disappeared, the children started to make grape jelly. The flavor changed, but the jelly making tradition was preserved. The landscape plan for the new building included more beach plum bushes so the jelly making tradition may change again in a few years!

Another traditional activity that has evolved through the years is the annual December walk in the woods to cut down a tree. In the beginning, when the school had fewer children, they would go in to the woods behind the school and cut down a small tree to decorate. As the years went by, each group cut down a tree and brought it in to decorate until it got to 5 young trees each year. A few years ago, teachers started talking about changing the tree tradition. Cutting down that many trees this day in age just did not make sense. So, teachers began to dig up a very small tree in the woods and care for it in the classroom until it could be re-planted. This was a good idea, but the chances of the young trees surviving that process were less than 100%. At Berrybrook we teach children to take care of themselves, to take care of each other and to take care of the earth. Teachers felt we really needed to think about this tree tradition.

At a recent staff meeting we had a long discussion about this tradition. We discussed having the children go to the woods to decorate a living tree. That was appealing for a moment until Mrs. O'Neil reminded us that the decorations might hurt animals – so we thought, what if we decorated with seeds and berries? Once again, Mrs. O'Neil reminded us that once humans start leaving food, birds or animals would rely on us to continue. It would be irresponsible to provide food and then take it away. (Traditionally, Mrs. O'Neil has been our nature expert!)

We had quite a dilemma. At Berrybrook, traditions are important. But since 1954, we have become much more environmentally conscious. We no longer use food in art projects – we have eliminated macaroni necklaces, and we do without rice or beans in the water table – entire cultures survive on such food, why would we have children play with it? We recycle paper and plastic and glass. Even our new school house was designed to be as "green" as possible with good insulation and other energy saving devices.

Many children have holiday trees at home and the tree decorated for the Festival of Trees at Plimoth Plantation will be on display at Berrybrook in December, so is it really necessary to cut down trees from our Berrybrook woods for sake of tradition? It is important to note that the children currently in our classrooms are not particularly aware that they are engaging in traditions. Every activity they experience is brand new. It is their parents and older siblings who let them know that things like the jelly and latkes and ice cream they make at Berrybrook are traditions. I realize parents look forward to Berrybrook traditions and cherish them. I know families who have four pine cone turkeys made by each child that come out every year for Thanksgiving! Parents and teachers look forward to the special projects and activities that happen every year and I have my favorites too. It is difficult to change something that has been a lovely memory for so many, but as people responsible for educating young children we have to be sure that the lessons we are passing on reflect our values.

At the end of our staff meeting we decided that the really important element of the tree tradition was the excitement the children felt decorating it and then sharing it with their families. After much discussion, we decided to have a one "community" tree for the entire school to decorate, but it will be different, not one cut from our woods. Our goal is for the tree to reflect the light and warmth of the holiday season. Look for the tree to appear soon.

Of course, December contains many other Berrybrook traditions. Take time to enjoy the Berrybrook crafts, songs, decorations, snacks and gifts that happen during the holiday season and our most important year round tradition - of caring for ourselves, caring for each other and caring for the earth.

6 Potatoes 4 Tablespoons flour 1 Teaspoon Salt 1 Egg

# Toys of Value

Making decisions about what toys to purchase during the holidays gets more difficult each year. Children and parents are inundated with television ads from thousands of toy makers trying to convince them that their toy is best. Parents are under tremendous pressure to buy the "hot" item that may be sold through films, TV ads and even fast food restaurants. Play is essential for children and toys are the tools of play. Healthy toys promote imaginative, creative, interesting, and long lasting play. A group called TRUCE (Teachers for Resisting Unhealthy Children's Entertainment) has some hints for choosing healthy toys. They recommend the following:

- Choose toys that can be used in many ways
- Choose toys that allow the children to determine the play
- Choose toys that appeal to children at more than one age
- Choose toys that are not linked to video games, TV or movies
- Choose toys that can be used with other toys for new and more complex play
- Choose toys that promote respectful, non-stereotyped, nonviolent interactions
- Choose some gifts to make at home with your children to give to others. Berrybrook Playdough is always a nice gift!

#### Berrybrook School Playdough Recípe

4 cups flour 2 cups salt 4 cups water 4 tbsp oil 4 tbsp cream of tartar

Mix all in a large pot. Cook on medium heat until dough forms. Cool, knead, and store in an air-tight container.

# Berrybrook Board of Dírectors

In 1954, Katharine Bailey Mann gave Berrybrook its start and its focus. In 1957, she created a separate trust to honor her mother, and to further support Berrybrook, her life's work. She created the Lucretia Prentiss Bailey Trust of Massachusetts to ensure that Berrybrook would survive, and thrive, forever.

In July, 2008, the Trust sold 40.57 acres to the Town of Duxbury for conservation purposes. The 40.57 acre purchase consisted of two parcels; a 27.23 acre open field on the south side of Winter Street, and a 13.3 acre open field and woods on the north side of Winter Street. This scenic agricultural streetscape is rare in Duxbury and the region, and also contains rare species habitat.

The sale of the land enabled Berrybrook School to build for the future and at the same time the sale ensured that the beautiful and historic landscape would be preserved forever. The town of Duxbury has named the conservation land **Berrybrook Fields**. Recently, you may have read in newspapers about activities organized by Duxbury's Open Space and Recreation Committee to increase awareness about the newly acquired conservation land on Winter Street.

The Lucretia Prentiss Bailey Trust continues to hold 27.33 acres of land for Berrybrook School, including the land surrounding our school buildings and our beautiful woods and trails.

The Board of Directors will foster strong communications between Berrybrook

and the town and will help to spread the word about future events held on the land. The newly established Berrybrook Fields are the perfect neighbor and a fitting compliment to Berrybrook School. We encourage all Berrybrook families to take advantage of both resources so generously provided by Katharine Mann. It's a gift for all seasons.

# Random Acts of Kindness

The gift of giving. Doing for others. Joyful celebration. Fond family memories.

Are these the thoughts and feelings that come to mind for you in this month of December? Or does the holiday music that begins on the radio November 1st, Santa Claus arriving at the mall by this very same date and invitations to holiday parties being delivered in late October make you think of these instead:

Busy, busy, busy! Too much to do! So many people to remember! Not enough time...

How is it that the time of year that we should slow down to be thankful, grateful, kind and giving towards others becomes the busiest time of year where instead we feel overwhelmed, stressed and choose not to live in the moment? It helps to remember the feeling one has when they are at Berrybrook and how its meaningful life lessons are so appropriate to this time of year.

Sometimes life in general, not just during the holidays, can feel overwhelming and stressful as mentioned above. I, personally, can have so much on my mind on my way to Berrybrook eveyr morning and every morning it is the same. I turn off my engine, reach for my work bag and walk across the parking lot to the schoolhouse. The sheep sometimes greet me with a "baah" or two then soon realize I'm not Mrs. O'Neil so continue grazing. The sun shines on the layers of trees and grass to the right of the schoolhouse as my breathing slows and my mood calms. I look out at the playground where later that morning the children will be playing and sharing ideas. Lastly, before entering the schoolhouse, I look to the farmhouse and remember that each day we try to carry on Katharine Mann's dream.

So many people say, "There's just something about Berrybrook!" that it's almost a cliché but it's true. There is an almost magical happening that occurs when people are here. They speak kindly to one another, respect each other and are thoughtful, considerate and compassionate. I finally figured out why this is. One could say "It's the way they speak here, turning everything around to be in a more positive light." This undoubtedly has an effect. In the book <u>The Power of Intention</u> by Wayne Dyer it is said, "research has shown that a simple act of kindness directed toward another...stimulates the production of serotonin...a naturally occurring substance in the body that makes us feel more comfortable, peaceful, and even blissful... in both the recipient of the kindness and the person extending the kindness."

It all makes sense. One person speaks kindly, the other responds kindly and so it continues. When children hear teachers speaking to them with kindness and respect they automatically feel good and important, not to mention respected and cared for. But children, as well as adults, don't always remember to be positive, respectful and kind. Guess what? Dyer goes onto say that "...even more amazing is that the persons OBSERVING the act of kindness have similar beneficial results. Imagine this! Kindness EXTENDED, RECEIVED or OBSERVED impacts physical health and feelings of everyone involved!"

If only we could remember all of this during the busyness of the holiday season. If only we could remember all of this every day of the year. Although at times I forget, being at Berrybrook helps me to remember.

The other day my daughter came home from school with a treasure in hand. She hugged me, told me to close my eyes and placed the treasure on the table before me. "Open!" she said and I looked down to see a small business card type note that read "SMILE! You've just received a random act of kindness! Pass it on!" After hugging my daughter in return I thought, "I'll pass it along through my actions at Berrybrook tomorrow...and I won't even need the card."
