# Notes from the Headmaster

As I was showing a prospective parent around Berrybrook last week, she asked me, "What part of the day would the children be learning?" her question caught me by surprise. I suppose it is because at Berrybrook we know that children learn everywhere and at all times. Children learn at arrival, holding hands in the parking lot, holding the door for others, and greeting teachers and friends. They are learning self help skills hanging things up in their cubbies. During independent choice they are learning how to concentrate and problem solve and at circle time they are learning how to be part of a community. Snack provides an opportunity to master hand washing and table manners. On the playground there is unlimited development of motor skills and an abundance of observations of the natural world. My response to her question about what time of the day children learn is **every second**. Every moment is a teachable moment and children are learning from their environment, peers, parents and teachers every waking moment.

Math, Science, Literacy, Social Studies and Health are all part of the interconnected curriculum at Berrybrook. Teachers arrange classrooms and activities to include all of these important areas, but also included are interactions to help children develop social skills. Berrybrook teachers design their

classrooms and curriculum to promote a sense of empathy and community, and conflicts between children are seen as opportunities for helping children become sensitive human beings. One way teachers help children develop empathy is by being active listeners. Teachers model good listening and encourage them to listen to each other. We suggest that they look directly at each other when they have something to say. We encourage responses that include how they feel about things. When children know they will be listened to, they are more apt to listen to some one else. Children in fact, are able to recite many ways to be kind and good to friends. Intellectually, they know the right choices, but developmentally, they are just beginning to put them into practice. It is our job to provide them with opportunities to demonstrate how kind they are and to practice being a good friend.

At Berrybrook, we believe that children learn everywhere and at all times. Teachers see even the tiniest incident as an opportunity to help a child learn something about the world or themselves, and then the beauty of our work is that we get to see the child put what they have learned into practice. Teachers and I celebrated a recent milestone we observed in two of our students. In the multipurpose room during an enrichment program, a younger student stood up in front of an older student and blocked the view. There were several teachers in the room and we were interested in seeing how this situation would develop, so we did not intervene. The older student said very clearly, "Please sit down I can't see." The younger student turned around and looked at the speaker, but did not sit down. Then the older student repeated the request in a slightly firmer voice, "Please sit down, I can't see." This time it worked. The younger child sat down and the older student could now see what was going on. It was perfect. Problem solved with no teacher intervention. The older child has learned to get his needs met in an appropriate, respectful way, and the younger child has learned to listen to a request and respond with understanding. Teachers and I were thrilled with the outcome because we know how many individual Berrybrook moments went into building those important skills in those two children.

It is so important for teachers and parents to remember that children are learning not just in the classroom, or in a piano lesson, or a karate class or a soccer camp. They are learning from every situation. Sure they are learning from us when we are reading a book or cooking with them or teaching them a specific lesson, but they are also learning from us in other daily interactions – in the ways we treat and speak to them and others. The manner in which we handle difficult situations or problems will determine how they will respond to a similar situation in their future. We teach children how to read and write, but they also learn from us how to be compassionate and flexible and patient. If we want children to have all of those qualities, we must model them. Our children are learning all the time, everywhere.

In April, we will be painting blown eggs to celebrate the beginning of spring. We will be collecting blown eggs as soon as you are able to accomplish this task. Remember to break up the yolk or it will be difficult to blow through the little hole. A notice with directions was recently sent to help with this activity but if you have any problems please let us know.

Outside our windows we have placed two bird feeders which are busily being visited by a variety of birds. The children have been observing the birds flying between the trees and feeders and are enjoying watching all the activity. At circle time we have talked about the importance of keeping the feeders full therefore the children will have the opportunity to fill them as needed.

Another sign of spring is the arrival of insects which we will be observing and learning some interesting facts about. Throughout the year we teach the children to respect all living things even small creatures. Our classroom has bug catchers which we use frequently to save any insects that find their way inside.

As we arrive and depart from Berrybrook each day we have the opportunity to drive by two special animals, Thelma and Louise. The 4/5 day children will be learning about sheep this month and discover what they can do with the sheep's wool. Watch for a unique project that the children will be creating relating to these animals.

## "Why I Love Being a Preschool Teacher"

Having daily conversations with four and five year old children really gives you an insight on how they think at this age level. Children of this age really do live in the present, and by listening to them you learn what is important to them right now. Hearing things from a child's point of view can make a teacher's day so much brighter.

Last year, I wrote an article about how much I enjoy being a teacher at Berrybrook School. At the end of the article, I had shared some quotes I had recorded from the children all year. The parents seemed to love it, so I decided to do it again this year. Here are some of the things your children have said during class this year:

At circle, Mrs. Caddle introduced a new song, "The More We Get Together", and when it was done a child said, "Now THAT was like the worst song ever!"

I was talking to two girls about how I just saw one of them at a home visit, when the other girl asked me, "Well how did you get there? Who drove you there?" When I told her that I drove myself, she said, "You can drive?! How OLD are you?!"

While working at the project table, a child comes over and asks me what the children are making. After telling him that they are making "fire cats", he said, "It don't look much like a fire cat!"

While trying real hard to push a foot into a shoe that fell off, a child states, "I'm pushing so hard, I think the ground is cracking!"

After telling the children that we will be cleaning up the block creations in five minutes, a child says, "I'm sure glad it is not five minutes yet."

At the snack table, a child says, "I don't want cream cheese or butter because it is body fat."

One child apologizes to another for knocking over his creation. The second child says, "Will you help me fix it? Because when you 'break it, you fix it' that's the rule in my house."

A child holds up a toy dreidal and asks Mrs. Keeley, "Did you make this out of clay?"

While practicing our "Winter Wonderland" dance moves for our holiday concert, a child says, "All this dancing is making me feel like a girl."

When Patrice from "Hop, Skip, and Jump" was explaining the importance of exercise for your heart, one child says, "My Mommy did her exercise this morning to her tape and we did it with her!"

A child describes one of his teachers to his mother: "You know, Mom, the teacher with the blonde hair that has the light brown sprinkles."

During circle, we sometimes play the "Little Pony" game which asks the children to look at their clothes and if they are wearing the color of the pony we sing, then they have to go in the middle and gallop. Every time we sing, the "little 'white' pony", the children tell Mrs. Caddle she has to go in the middle and gallop because her hair is white!

After Mrs. Caddle explained her trip to Puerto Rico to the children, one of them asked her, "Did you see someone named, 'Jan,' there?"

A child asked me, "Mrs. Fosdick, is your 'brother grown-up' going to come play the piano again?"

After a discussion about President Lincoln, and why we celebrate his birthday with a holiday, a child comes into the block room and declares, "Mrs. Caddle! It can't be President Lincoln's birthday! He's already dead! And he didn't even make a crown!"

A child's grandmother told me one afternoon, that her granddaughter wanted to wear her "wiggle pants" to school because Mrs. Fosdick wears her wiggle pants, too.

I hope you all enjoy the things your children say as much as I do!
