Notes from the Headmaster

The complimentary snacks were healthy and filling and the refreshments for sale complimented the cool fall day. Tassia Russell deserves a special mention for single handedly painting a special design on every little face and thank you to her son Jack who waited patiently for his turn at the very end. Mothers and fathers who volunteered to make the festival happen worked hard to make sure all of the children attending the festival were safe, happy and engaged. The event really brought out the best in all of us and demonstrated what we can achieve when we work together. The Berrybrook Parent's Association is a strong organization that combines the enthusiasm of new parents and the experience of seasoned ones. I think that Katharine Mann, our founder would be very proud of the BPA and its sustained support of the school and I know she would have enjoyed the Fall Festival as much as I did. 2 & 3 Day Activities

The month of October began with the important subject of fire safety. The children were able to try out real equipment and learn about "emergency evacuations", which are practiced monthly at Berrybrook. We even had a visit from the Duxbury Fire Department which came complete with a ladder truck. The next week we focused on the beautiful autumn world around us: taking nature walks and working with acorns and leaves. For the last two weeks we were involved in a lot of orange activities - pumpkins, making fresh orange juice and collages. As Halloween approached we read stories about the holiday and made special treats for our celebrations.

As November progresses, we will be working with wood. The children will be creating unique structures and painting them, as well as working with tools that are necessary for building. Then we will turn our attention towards Thanksgiving. November is a natural time to talk with children about being thankful for family, friends, and the abundance of good things nature provides. Children will be making seasonal favorites including bead necklaces and turkeys and each class will arrange a Thanksgiving observance appropriate for their group. How fast the year is already speeding along, it is amazing to see how guickly the children have made Berrybrook their own.

Fall Parent Conferences have started and will continue through the month of November. The meetings are a wonderful opportunity for teachers and parents to share information and to make plans for the best possible experience at Berrybrook. During the conference teachers will share observations of your child and touch on specific areas of development.



4 & 5 Day Activities

The 4 and 5 Day classes have been learning about shoes. We talked about the history of shoe making and the children were able to see and touch different kinds of shoes and shoe making tools. We hope that you have enjoyed seeing our display on the table outside the office. The following is a chant that the children enjoy reciting:

Cobbler

There's a cobbler down the street, Mending shoes for little feet. With a bang and a bang And a bang, bang, bang. With a bang and a bang And a bang, bang, bang.

In October, the children enjoyed working on Halloween projects. We also talked about changing seasons, apples, pumpkins, spiders and bats. We learned about pretend and real with visits from the Bones family and by participating in a Halloween play based on the book "*The Little Old Lady Who Wasn't Afraid Of Anything*," by Linda Williams. We ended the month of October with pizza made by the children!

In November the children will be learning about Pilgrims and Wompanoags. We will visit Plimoth Plantation on Thursday, November 13.th where the children can get a glimpse of everyday life in 1627. What kind of homes did they live in? What did they eat and how did they cook it? What did they wear? <u>How about their shoes?</u> Did the children go to school? What did they do for fun? This experience helps the children begin to understand our local history.

When we visit the Plantation, we ask the children to please refer to the Wompanoags as Native People and to ask relevant questions, as they are often direct descendants of the Wompanoag tribes. We explain to the children that the people in the village are pretending to be Pilgrims. These people have studied very hard to learn all about the Pilgrims they are portraying. They will answer our questions as if they were living in 1627.

When we return to Berrybrook we will have discussions about what we saw on our trip and participate in activities which will help to summarize all that we have learned. Throughout November we will be talking about family traditions and what it means to be thankful. Just before our Thanksgiving Holiday break, the children will participate in baking and preparing a special snack to share together on Tuesday, November 25th, including freshly made butter.The children chant these words when shaking the cream into butter.

Shake, shake, shake the cream, Shake and make it flutter. Shake, shake, shake the cream, And turn it into butter.

Facts about Pílgrím Chíldren

Children in 1600s New England had to work hard. Their chores included: fetching water from the brook or spring, gathering fire wood, herding animals, gathering berries and other wild plants, and helping their parents cook, clean, preserve food, plant and harvest crops, and care for younger children.

Children were expected to show courtesy to adults, including their parents, by bowing and curtsying to them.

Both girls and boys in 1600s England and New England wore Gowns (dresses) until they were seven years old.

Children often slept on mattresses that were laid on the floor at night. The mattresses were usually stuffed with straw. Some children slept in their parent's bed.

Children and adults probably only took baths a few times a year. They thought bathing was unhealthy.

Berrybrook Outdoors

This month, the outdoor temperature will start to drop. Please remember to dress children ready for outdoor play. We plan on going outside every day. Warm layers are a good idea, so children can remove clothing if they get too hot. The weather changes so rapidly in New England, children should have hats and mittens available. Also, it is a good idea to check your child's change of clothing at school. Clothing dropped off in September may not be a good match for November weather!

After mother nature sent a hard frost teachers stopped applying insect repellent. Repellent will still be available at school if parents would like to apply it to their own children. We will inform parents in the spring if insect repellent once again becomes part of our routine.

Community Service

With Thanksgiving approaching and the start of the holiday season, the Berrybrook community puts emphasis on helping others.

For the last 7 years, children in the 4 & 5 Day classes have coordinated donations for the animals at the Kingston Animal Shelter. Starting this month, all Berrybrook children may bring in donations for the animals and place them in the decorated boxes in our lobby. Mrs O'Neil has spoken to the shelter to find out what items the animals really need. If you could donate just one of these items it would be greatly appreciated.

The Value of Parent/Teacher Conferences

Berrybrook strives to provide a positive, nurturing and open environment for its community of children, parents, staff and administration. Day to day interactions provide an opportunity to address questions and concerns, however individual parent/teacher conference time is valuable.

Why make time for a Conference?

Conferences are an essential ingredient for quality early childhood education.

Conferences provide an opportunity for teachers and parents to discuss a child's progress, identify concerns and to set future goals.

Conferences help to identify your child as his or her own person, with unique strengths, weaknesses and attributes.

How to make the most of a Conference

Plan on having both parents attend the conference.

Tell your child in advance about this time for the teacher and parents to talk.

Prepare in advance your thoughts, questions or concerns. Alert the teacher in advance about a particular topic or concern you wish to discuss. Bring in and/or take notes.

Follow-up with teachers on any agreed upon school/home approaches.

Follow up with your child with an age appropriate discussion about the conference.

<u>Remember</u>

Relax...parents and teachers work as a team - being open minded, respectful and honest while supporting each other for the benefit of the child.

Stay focused on the child. A child's well being and strengths are most comfortable to discuss. Conference time provides an opportunity to address any areas of concern. Through open communication a strategy can be agreed upon. Children respond best when they receive similar responses in both their school and home environments.

Preschool is a time to begin to build life skills such as separating from parents, cooperating with teachers, sharing with peers, developing conflict resolution skills, participating appropriately in group activities and beginning to discover oneself.

Parent/Teacher Conferences is time well spent!

When I pick-up my son from the playground, I look out over the beautiful open fields that will remain protected for generations to come. Both the school and the townspeople have placed a priority on protecting these spaces for our children. Take a moment and look around you when you are at Berrybrook, there are beautiful natural areas everywhere.

Professional Development

Berrybook has a wonderful combination of teachers who are eager to learn and a board who values professional development. The board provides the time and funding for teachers to build skills and this professional environment helps to maintain a quality early childhood program for our children.

During our first Professional Development Day on Friday October 24, we had an early breakfast meeting with the Personnel Committee of the Board. At 9:00 we started a 3 hour training by Christine Haak from the Duxbury Emergency Management Agency. The training included information regarding any alert or accident at the Pilgrim Nuclear Power Plant and the procedures in place for such an emergency including notification of schools and families. sheltering in place procedures, and evacuation to our host school, Braintree High. After lunch we discussed our Department of Early Education and Care re-licensing which will happen in January, and the remainder of the afternoon was spent working on classroom portfolios which are part of the NAEYC (National Association for the Education of Young Children) re-accreditation process.

In addition to the 3 professional development days during the school year, the Board provides 2 extra hours of planning time for teachers each month. The extra time is extremely productive and the wonderful results of those meetings will have a positive effect on the quality of the program we offer children and parents.

The professional development of Berrybrook teachers and staff extends to the larger community. Seven staff attended a presentation on October 28th by Lynne Reeves Griffin author of *"The Negotiation Generation"* at the Duxbury Performing Arts Center. Berrybrook teachers stay current with new ideas and the issues parents of young children are facing.

We appreciate the support of Berrybook parents and will keep you up to date with additional professional development efforts.
