Notes from the Headmaster

"Self regulation is the newest kid on the block in terms of formal research recognition, but it turns out to be the strongest predictor not only of school achievement, but also of lifetime success. Also known as "executive function", it is mediated by the brain's prefrontal cortex, and is related to attention, motivation, planning, and general management of one's own mind - and life." (Impacting Readiness: Nature And Nurture; Jane M. Healy, ChildCare Exchange, March 2011)

Self Regulation allows children to do the right thing because they want to, not because they have to. At Berrybrook, teachers help children develop self regulation and they do it by allowing them to make their own choices and decisions, and honoring their choices. That does not mean they can "choose" to hurt another child, because teachers certainly enforce safety rules, but we know that children will learn self control, when they have the opportunity to make choices and decisions and the opportunity to experience the consequences of their decisions. At Berrybrook, we see first year children developing self regulation as they separate from parents, enter the classroom with confidence, "choose" to wash their hands without being told to do so by an adult, and make their own choice about a classroom activity. Our second year students exhibit a great degree of self regulation as teachers allow and encourage children to take responsibility for their work, their problem solving and each other. Teachers incorporate skills of self regulation into meaningful learning opportunities that challenge childrens' curiosity, imagination and creativity. At Berrybrook we know children with good self-regulation are able to control their emotions and behavior, resist impulses, and exert self-control and discipline. Parents and Teachers may be "in charge" of external conditions, but truly, children are in charge of themselves and their own feelings.

First Year Program News

Spring is slowly making its way into our classrooms! A traditional early spring activity at Berrybrook is the tapping of a maple tree. All the classes have made their way over to the tree bucket, and may have tried a drip or two. The children who have tasted the sap usually come to one of two conclusions: the sap tastes like water or the sap tastes like syrup. Second Year Program News

SPRING Spring is coming, Spring is coming, How do you think I know? I saw a pussy willow And that is how I know.

After a very snowy winter, spring arrived on March 20th. Somehow spring doesn't seem official until April 1st. Just saying the word "April" conjures up images of sunshine, warmer weather, and of course, rain! However, we all know what April showers bring to us in May.

The children at Berrybrook will be watching for signs of flowers, and SPRING. With warmer weather's return, there will be more outdoor experiences available for them. We will be planting grass and flowers, measuring and observing them as they grow. Children can observe the new growth of forsythia and pussy willows as they drive around their town. Look for projects involving these trees and bushes that your child will be making at school.

Another sign that spring is surely here is the return of birds to our bird feeders. Who will come to feast at Berrybrook this year? We will be watching for hummingbirds, perhaps they will arrive during the second week of April.

We will be identifying robins as well. You will most likely hear your child singing the catchy tune, "The Red, Red Robin", and possibly demonstrating sign language for some of the lyrics.

One of the cornerstones of the curriculum at Berrybrook is the study of nature. Last fall, children had the opportunity to study the life cycle of pumpkins. Currently they are learning how sap is tapped from the maple tree here at Berrybrook. Teachers know to tap the tree when the days are above freezing, and the nights are below freezing.

The children had all five senses engaged once they viewed the sap flowing! They <u>saw</u> sap flowing, then <u>touched</u> the tree and the free flowing sap, they <u>heard</u> the steady "plop" of the sap in the bucket. What does the sap <u>taste</u> like? There were varying reviews! Finally – the delicious <u>smelling</u> sap as it boils down to syrup.

All of this culminated in a delicious traditional "Sugar on Snow" party which is based on a book, "Sugar On Snow', written in 1964 by Nancy Dingman Watson. Donuts, pickles, ice cream (snow) with REAL maple syrup from our tree was enjoyed by all!

Please remember to send in clean blown eggs next week. The children will be experiencing another longstanding tradition at Berrybrook – painting eggs.

The Strategic Planning Committee continues to forge ahead with help from the staff and the community. In addition to a review of our work with the Board of Directors, we also offered a community forum this month. Although there was a small number who attended, the forum was helpful in collecting more information from the perspective of Berrybrook families. Thank you so much to those who attended!

The Strategic Planning Committee has been meeting regularly since January, and we are very pleased with the amount of information we have collected. The task of establishing a new strategic plan is large; there are many aspects to cover just in the operation of the School, let alone providing all involved an opportunity to voice opinions and suggestions. With help from the Board of Directors, the staff, and the

community, our work over these first eight weeks has been to create a list of priority items. We have identified two main categories: Programming and Buildings & Grounds. These categories will help us further collect specific data and get us closer to action steps. The Committee has designed an on-line survey for parents and we are hoping that every family will participate. The Committee will analyze the data to best approach the feasibility of using space and resources to offer additional programming options to families. The Committee will also collect and analyze data to best approach the maintenance and use of our buildings and grounds. There have been many ideas proposed in our first two months of work.

We look forward to our next steps. April will bring more progress toward our end goal of a Strategic Plan document that will help guide our School for the next five to ten years.

Spring In New England

"It's gooey! It's slippery! It's gloppy!" What can it be? A parent might say, "It's messy. You'll get all dirty. You'll track it all over the car. Get out of it". Have you guessed yet? It's mud! And it is all of these things and many more.

To a preschooler, mud is very, very interesting. Playing in the mud is different from playing in sand, either wet or dry, or playing on the grass, or on the playground wood chips. Making mud is a scientific experiment. Many aspects of learning are taking place while playing in the mud. Children first and foremost enjoy a new sensory experience. Mud feels different from clay and play doh, it feels different from sand. You can change its consistency - add more dirt or sand, and the mud gets thicker. By adding twigs or pebbles, mud becomes coarser. Mixing in more water makes the mud juicier.

Language skills are emerging as children are playing in the mud. When observing children engaged in a muddy setting, listen to their vocalizations as they search for familiar and new words to describe the delicious way the mud feels. These statements lead to discussions among the young scientists to help them make sense of their experiments. Observational skills are at the forefront of scientific endeavors. Mud play involves sight sound, touch, and smell. Occasionally, taste is involved, but most children don't really enjoy the taste. Some mud makes a heavy plopping sound; other mud makes a light plipping sound. Mud can feel smooth, or grainy or slippery. Some mud feels cold, some mud is very warm.

Children use math skills in the mud puddle. How much more mud will fit into the bucket before it over flows? How can I make the mud stop oozing off the shovel? Mud play is also a good way to explore cause and effect. What happens when I drop a rock into the mud? Is it different from when I drop a rock into water? If I jump in the mud puddle, where does the mud go? If mud is left out in the sun, what will happen?

Imaginary play also emerges while playing in the mud. It can be used for cooking on a campfire, or made into mud pies to bake in a kitchen. It can be a dinosaur bog, or a frog home, or a construction site, or anything the imagination can conjure up. I remember watching my own children using mud and acorns out in the yard to make a stew. This stew became the focus of many weeks' worth of outdoor play. They couldn't wait to get home from school to return to their outdoor world and the stew. When we moved to a new state, it was very important that the stew pot get packed carefully. I explained that they could invent a new stew mixture at our new home. And they sure did!

Giving children the time and freedom to get messy allows them time to really explore. The joy on their faces and gleeful tones in their voices tells it all. When we provide opportunities for our children to use all of their senses while engaged in play, we are helping them to become active, engaged learners. Play clothes are a must. Soap and water are great tools for cleanup time. Happy Mud Trails!
