# Notes from the Headmaster

If you are a regular reader of this Newsletter, you will have had the good fortune of reading a series of articles written by Mrs. LaForest - "Separating", "Settling", "Surveying" and "Singing." The articles describe different stages children go through as they begin their first school experience and become part of a community that is outside of their immediate family. Reading those articles, I was reminded about of research that says adults working in groups pass through four stages called "Forming, Storming, Norming, Performing." Upon reflection, it occurred to me that groups of all ages, including our young children in their classrooms, go though their own versions of those four stages.

"Forming" happens as we start the school year. After the initial bouts of separation anxiety the children are happy to come to school. First year students begin to notice each other, but they are most interested in exploring their new environment and materials. Initially, they work independently, or "parallel play." During this stage, teachers help children become familiar with routines and classmates including learning each other's names at circle time through songs and games. Second year students are already familiar with Berrybrook, but as the group forms, they will keep old friends, begin to "make new friends" and get to know their teachers.

"Storming" occurs as the children become comfortable in their classrooms and with their peers and often results in children feeling so comfortable they express exactly what is on their mind without regard to others. During the fall and into December you will hear teachers saying, "How does that make you feel?" or "What could you say to your friend?" and "Do you know what saying sorry means?"

(Saying you're sorry means you will change your behavior!) First year students may be very emotional during this phase and struggle with initiating friendships - sometimes thinking physical contact is the best way to impress a friend. Second year students often experiment with strong language - "You're not my friend anymore," or "You can't come to my birthday party." Helping students navigate friendships and become part of a community is one of the most important tasks of Berrybrook teachers and they do it very well.

"Norming" showed its first signs in December, and will become commonplace as we resume school this month. Berrybrook teachers know through many years of experience that children return in January a few inches taller and ready to learn. All of the work teachers did in the fall to provide children with the words to be kind and solve problems comes to fruition as children learn to get their own needs met without imposing on the rights of others. First year students will often be heard stating rules - "Buildings can only be as high as your chin," or "Running is for outside." They will also feel confident saying "I don't like that," as well as "Do you want to play with me?" Second year students now understand that if a friend wants to sit beside someone else at circle time, it doesn't mean your friendship is over. They have the ability to ask anyone in their class to join them at the snack table, and find common ground for an interesting conversation. Now that's a skill that lasts a lifetime!

"Performing" begins early in the new year, and builds through the spring. During the first three stages, when children are working so hard on emotional and social development, they are also learning in many other areas. Language, Math, Social Studies, Science, Art, and Motor Skills have all been developing since September, but now during the "Performing" stage they really take off. First year students come through the gate already knowing what their plan is for the day. Through cooperation, piles of blocks now become buildings. Complete, legible first names are showing up on projects and art work. Children are suggesting their own experiments for the water table and many other classroom activities. All this is possible because our environment fosters self discipline, encourages children to be independent and responsible for their own behavior, and to follow basic rules of safety and courtesy in the classroom. In the performing stage, children will manage the behavior of the group with minimal teacher control.

And of course, during this stage we see our second year students turn into kindergarteners right before our eyes. Over the past two years at Berrybrook, they have become confident, interested and hardworking learners. Observing them in the classroom, teachers know they are well prepared for the next stage in their education. They have the academic skills to succeed, but more importantly, they have learned to manage their emotions, communicate their feelings, get their needs met, and be a contributing member of a group. Through the spring and right into ice-cream day the second year groups become very close. It is a very special experience for the children and their teachers.

It may seem like I am predicting the future. How could I possibly know now, how the children will be performing in June? It's because I know the Berrybrook philosophy and how our teachers prepare children for life in a manner that respects them and preserves their childhood. Forming, Storming, Norming and Performing the Berrybrook way.

#### First Year Program News

December was a busy month at Berrybrook, and the focus was on families. We learned about some different ways families celebrate the holidays. Children created special gifts for their families and baked cookies for family members to enjoy at our sing-along. The children worked hard to prepare their gift of song. Thank you to all the families who joined us on that special day.

Each first year class has a family photo bulletin board. Children enjoy looking at their own and each others' photos. If your child has not had a chance to bring a family photo, you can still send one in. Please feel free to add to or update photos, as we will keep them through the end of the school year.

January brings a new year and a new beginning. We will start by celebrating the New Year with party hats. Next we will spend time talking about some animals, such as birds and bears. We will end January by transforming our housekeeping areas into the "Berrybrook Hospital." During this time we will learn about keeping ourselves healthy. We will even talk about ways to keep our pets healthy. Nature walks will resume in January. Perhaps we will be lucky enough to see some tracks from our animal friends!

Although January typically brings colder weather and even snow, we will continue to go outside every day. Please be sure to send you child with hats, mittens, snow pants, and boots.

#### Enrollment 2012-2013

All first year families should have received enrollment information over our holiday break. January is the month reserved for all current and alumni families to enroll at Berrybrook for the 2012-2013 school year. The second year program offers one 5 Day morning group and two 4 Day afternoon groups. All groups are limited to 18 students and all have 3 teachers. When submitting an application, parents should circle their program preference. The placement of children into classes is a process which takes into account individual needs of children, balance in the composition of each class and parent preference. While we would like to honor every preference, space or other factors may limit the number of children assigned to an individual class.

The Berrybrook Board of Directors sets aside funds for tuition assistance through the Helen Wheeler Scholarship Fund. If you are interested in receiving information about tuition assistance please contact Mrs. Keeley.

## **Snow Cancellation**

Berrybrook will cancel school if Duxbury Schools <u>or</u> the Silver Lake School District close due to a snow emergency.

Because many Berrybrook families and staff travel from outlying communities, it is our policy to cancel classes whenever Duxbury Public Schools and/or Silver Lake Schools are closed. Parents should watch news reports for cancellation of these school systems. The voice mail system at Berrybrook at 781-585-2307 will have a snow cancellation message if we are closed due to a snow emergency.

Beyond a formal cancellation, we urge parents to use their best judgment about driving young children to school in inclement weather. In the event of a severe snow storm, power failure, loss of heat or other emergency, the school may be required to close early. Parents will be contacted to pick up children. Children will remain with Berrybrook staff until released to a parent or emergency contact.

# Separating, Settling, Surveying, Singing...Snowing!

"It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas...la, la, la, la, la, la..." We sing this if there is ever snow in December. When snow comes in January we should sing, "It's beginning to look a lot like...SCIENCE...la, la, la, la, la, la...!" That is because so many scientific concepts can be studied with snow. Observing snow in the water table for the morning provides first hand experience with melting and demonstrates how a solid turns into a liquid. When we experiment with leaving water outside overnight, voila! Ice! The process of liquid turning into a solid is observed.

What else can we do with snow? We can shovel it, sweep it, shape and mold it, even color it! Is it cold enough to snow? Discussions about temperature and checking our thermometer help us understand if it's too cold to go outside or that "the temperature today tells us that we need our coat, hat, mittens and boots!" And what about putting on all that gear? It may not be science but it sure is a lesson in patience, perseverance, and increases confidence and self esteem.

Once we have all our outdoor clothes on, let's explore! What do animals do in the winter? Some hibernate, some travel about in the snow and we can follow their tracks! What do animals like birds and squirrels do for food in the winter? Maybe we can do our part to help them. What happens to trees and plants in the winter? We can observe them on our monthly nature walks. We can even learn how plants can grow *inside* in winter as we observe our paperwhite flowers grow taller and taller, and then bloom into beauty.

Finally, and this may not be scientific, what about the pure fun of snow? Making snow people, snow angels, falling into the snow with a friend, working really hard to walk in deep snow, sledding on the hill perhaps...fun, fun, fun! So, here's hoping for LOTS of snow this January, right? (Well, maybe just at Berrybrook!)
