Notes From the Headmaster

During the summer months, I have a chance to catch up on my reading. I love to read and I usually try to include a variety of genres; best sellers, classics, recommendations from friends and a current early childhood publication. This summer, I picked up *Mind In The Making* by Ellen Galinsky, president and co-founder of the Families and Work Institute. Her book lists what she feels are "The seven essential life skills every child needs." I was particularly interested in her book because I feel that at Berrybrook, teachers focus on these same skills that serve a child well over a lifetime.

Focus and Self Control Perspective Taking Communicating Making Connections Critical Thinking Taking on Challenges Self-Directed, Engaged Learning (Galinsky, E. (2010). *Mind in the Making NAEYC* Special Edition,. *NY, NY* Harper Collins Publishers)

We have only been in school a few weeks, and already, children are building these skills. Just think of how children are <u>taking on challenges</u> at the start of school by separating from parents and learning new routines. Ms. Galinsky confirms what we already know - "Life is full of stresses and challenges. Children who are willing to take on challenges (instead of avoiding them or simply coping with them) do better in school and in life." Berrybrook children are embracing their environments where <u>self-directed</u> and engaged learning is provided and encouraged. As our school year unfolds, children will continue to develop these seven important skills. At Berrybrook, we often say that we prepare children for life. We are off to a good start.

First Year Program News

Our First Year children are making new friends and learning lots of names and new songs. We will look at fruits from this harvest season, some red, some green and some orange. Of course we will be learning songs, hearing stories and playing games around these topics. We may even be able to do some leaf raking. October wraps up with a friendly celebration for Halloween. We will carve a class pumpkin and make a special snack in school.

Our Berrybrook Parent Discussion group kicks off in the month of October. The first evening is very helpful in sharing and offering tips on helping out in your child's classroom. Following this evening, parents will have the opportunity to sign up as a volunteer. If you plan on volunteering, it is a good idea to attend the October 6th Parent Discussion Group at 7:00pm.

Soon we will be sharing information about the first year "Memory Books." The books are a Berrybrook tradition and a lovely keepsake created for each child. The books contain photographs of the children taken by teachers throughout the year and some parents like to include some of their children's art work. So you may want to save some treasures found in your child's cubbie for this project!

Second Year Program News

Since the first days of school in September, Second Year students have been practicing saying goodbye at the door, washing their hands and beginning their day. Thank you to all parents as you have helped tremendously with this step of independence for your children.

September involved interesting first projects of the year such as watercolor fish, fish suncatchers...even fish for "fishing"! Children practice skills such as tracing, cutting and writing daily at Berrybrook and these projects got us off to a wonderful start! Traditional projects hold strong importance, also. Waiting in cubbies, families found their child's quahog garden made by choosing their shell, then carefully placing statice (another term for sea lavender) and baby's breath in that shell. The process of making jelly occurs for all Second Year Classes in September and October and delicious Berrybrook Jelly is enjoyed by all families.

October brings with it learning about apples and nature. There will be taste testing and the recording of results of friends' favorites, leaf identification and more. Our unit on Fire Safety will involve meeting a very special character named Pickles in a chapter book read in all classes. Much thought and care will go into our projects relating to Halloween as spiders, bats, witches and pumpkins will decorate our room. Children work on some projects for a period of days and see how each step builds upon the last. We will make a favorite story about a Little Old Lady Who Wasn't Afraid of Anything come to life as October comes to an end.

Please feel free to visit our classrooms at Dismissal Time to see displays of our work, however thank you for keeping in mind that the children worked very hard cleaning their space for the next class to use it.

Teachers will be in touch with parents to arrange for volunteers to help with our pizza making snack for our Harvest Celebration, as well as finding out what hobbies or talents parents might be interested in sharing with their child's class this year.

The Value of Parent/Teacher Conferences

Berrybrook strives to provide a positive, nurturing and open environment for children, parents and staff. Day to day interactions provide an opportunity to address questions and concerns and in November, parents will have the opportunity to schedule individual conference time with one of their child's teachers.

Why make time for a Conference?

Conferences are an essential ingredient for quality early childhood education.

Conferences provide an opportunity for teachers and parents to discuss a child's progress, identify concerns and to set future goals.

Conferences help to identify your child as an individual with unique strengths, weaknesses and attributes.

How to make the most of a Conference

If possible, the ideal is to have both parents attend.

Parents are encouraged to prepare in advance thoughts, questions or concerns, and to bring in and/or take notes.

Teachers or parents may alert the other in advance of a topic or concern they wish to discuss.

Teachers and parents should agree on a plan to follow-up on any school/home approach discussed at the conference.

Parents may let their child know about this time for the teacher and parent to talk and follow up with the child.

Remember

Relax...parents and teachers work as a team - being open minded, respectful and honest while supporting each other for the benefit of the child.

Stay focused on the child. A child's well being and strengths are most comfortable to discuss. Conference time provides an opportunity to address any areas of concern. Through open communication a strategy can be agreed upon. Children respond best when they receive similar responses in both their school and home environments.

Preschool is a time to build life skills such as separating from parents, cooperating with teachers, sharing with peers, developing conflict resolution skills, participating appropriately in group activities, and beginning to discover oneself.

Parent/Teacher Conferences is time well spent!

Arrival & Dismissal

Please remember the front door will be locked 15 minutes after arrival time. Any families arriving late may ring the doorbell and Mrs. Watts or Mrs. Keeley will let you in. Thank you to parents for waiting until 9:00 in the morning and 1:00 in the afternoon to enter the classroom. Teachers need every minute to prepare for the children. Likewise, thank you for arriving on time for dismissal. Children worry if parents are late. If you have an emergency, please call the office so we can let your child and teachers know you are on your way. Please remember our safety rules:

- Drive Slowly.
- Supervise children after signing out.
- Latch the gate behind you.
- Hold hands in the parking lot.
- Children must <u>never</u> be left unattended in cars.

A helpful Berrybrook tradition has been for parents to meet another parent with younger children in the lot. One parent can watch younger children in the cars, while the other parent walks Berrybrook students to or from school. Please remember anytime you have an emergency or need help at arrival or dismissal, you may call the office and we will assist you!

They say it takes twenty-one days to form a habit. Thanks to a gradual process of half class visiting days, shortened sessions and now full schedule, children at Berrybrook are beginning to adjust to their daily routine in fewer days than twenty-one. How parents and children say good-bye may be similar to or different from others but once everyone washes their hands and begins their day it can be observed that everyone is settling in. Settling in to the routine of the day. Settling in by knowing where things belong in their classroom. Settling in to their play which is their day's work.

Although comfort in routine is apparent, children still participate in their own way depending on personality, temperament and learning style. Often displayed in the First Year Classes, children may observe the happenings in the classroom first before playing. Some may listen at Circle Time before one day singing. Others may watch movement activities before one day joining in. Similar for the Second Year Classes, children may observe others in play while staying in the comfort of a familiar friendship. Some may study the personalities and nuances of their teachers. Others practice new ways of doing the familiar such as Snack Time where they grow in greater ways of responsibility and independence.

First and Second Year Classes may differ in age and development, however in both programs the familiar song "Hello, My Name Is..." is sung, the question "What is your name?" is asked, and students may accidentally call Mrs. Dunn, Mrs. Capasso or Mrs. O'Neil, Mrs. Neal. All this occurs as we learn, grow and ... settle in.

I think it is important to greet every child who comes to Berrybrook each day and it gives me the opportunity to meet and to get to know the entire family, including younger and older siblings. Saying hello to everyone is a favorite aspect of my job, and I am not offended in the least if a child does not say, "Hello Mrs. Keeley" in return. I notice many parents encouraging their child to return my greeting, but please know that I understand that some children, especially our first year students may not feel ready to return a greeting just yet. I know from experience that soon, children will feel very comfortable giving me a hello at arrival and a goodbye at the gate. It is such a thrill for me the first time a child says, "Hi Mrs. Keeley!" spontaneously. Berrybrook teachers model and encourage polite behavior and we know through working with your children, that parents do the same at home. So, feel free to encourage your children to "Say Hello to Mrs. Keeley" but please know that I do not consider it a requirement! - Mrs. K
