Notes from the Headmaster

The poem on the first page of the newsletter makes me think of all of the "dear little plants" that you may see at Berrybrook. I hope all of you had the chance to look at the second year forsythia creations that were hung in the hallway last month. It is a sure sign of spring when I see them on display. This month, the forsythia have been replaced with pussy willow creations. These projects are traditions at Berrybrook and they are among my favorites for a few reasons.

First, the Forsythia and Pussy Willow creations represent the dear little plants that we have observed blooming outdoors after a long winter, and they always serve to lift our spirits.

Second, when I walk by the display in the hall, I marvel at how many individual interpretations of pussy willows can come out of the same classroom. The project captures the Berrybook philosophy so well. I know that preceding the actual artwork the children had a discussion in class about the outdoors and what was happening during the change of seasons. Then teachers provided examples of the actual dear little plants for the children to contemplate. What do they look like? How are the stems formed? How do the blossoms grow on the stems? Then the children were invited to the project table during class to record on paper what they had observed. They started by using a pencil to write PUSSY WILLOW at the top of their paper. Then they thought about how they would use the art materials the teachers prepared for them to create their own dear little plants. Please take a moment in the next week to look carefully at each pussy willow now on display in the hall. Some have long stems that stand straight, others have stems that bend gracefully. Some students chose to include the vase the pussy willows were in. As I said, children have been doing their pussy willow projects for many years, but each year they are so amazing. What's more amazing is that the children do the projects in class, and they appreciate the efforts of others - there is no right or wrong. Each creation is unique and just right. That is so Berrybrook.

Third, and the most important reason I love these spring projects is that they remind me of the "dear little plants" that have been growing in our classrooms all year. The children who were so young in September have grown so much. I am so proud of them. After school recently, a second year teacher commented, "I wish we could keep this group for another year, don't you feel that way too?" and all of the teachers agreed. We have grown so fond of the children and soon they will be leaving us. Fortunately, we have our first year "dear little plants" who will return to Berrybrook in the fall and they will be learning and growing and displaying their artwork in the hall. Next spring we'll be wanting them to stay another year, but they too will be ready for exciting new things.

Recently, The Parent Connection hosted a presentation from the renowned author and educator Tony Wagner. He spoke mostly on his recent novel <u>Creating Innovators: The Making of Young People Who Will Change the World.</u> As I sat in the Performing Arts Center listening to him speak, it occurred to me that most of the key elements that he believes enhance a child's success, are actually some of the cornerstones of Berrybrook's philosophy, and I wanted to highlight some of them in our Newsletter.

1. Children need to be innovative

We are all born curious, creative and imaginative but unless those qualities are actively supported and nurtured they wither on the vine. Wagner theorizes that those who have the interest and capability to problem solve and create will have the most rewarding careers and satisfying lives. Schools who are overly structured squeeze out this type of learning - at a very early age. Wagner believes it is imperative to allow children the time to learn by discovery.

2. Perseverance and Self-Discipline

These are best developed through unstructured and self-initiated play. It is through this type of play that children discover passion, purpose and intrinsic motivation. It's better for parents (and educators) to offer a "buffet of opportunities" that allows children to explore a range of activities rather than over schedule their lives with structured events.

3. Schooling often penalizes risk

Hanging on the walls of most elementary schools are pictures from different students that look exactly the same. Many schools stress the importance of following directions and penalize those who "think outside the box." More emphasis must be placed on learning through trial and error and asking questions. Again - there must be more time for discovery.

4. Instilling Initiative and Entrepreneurship

Be self directed. Intrinsic motivation is key. Given our culture's over reliance on structured play and learning, this skill will be a challenge for many kids unless they are given some reign to size up a situation, take risks and figure out a solution. The key is to allow kids to fail - and understand that learning actually comes through failing.

5. Enhance Curiosity and Imagination

Create! Kids who love to learn are more likely to be curious. They will find answers to problems because they can empathize and think out of the box. Letting kids find their flow in unstructured activities and creating time for imaginative play is critical for this skill to flourish.

As a parent, I know these can be difficult to believe and may seem counterintuitive as the pressures for your child to be able to count, read, write, etc., move to earlier and earlier ages. At Berrybrook, children constantly are learning these important lessons - but not by doing worksheets or flashcards - instead they learn in a hands-on environment that truly supports discovery and promotes a love for learning. Unstructured learning does not mean unorganized in any way. This type of learning encourages children to move at their own pace, find the answers to the questions that interest them. It nurtures curiosity and allows them to learn and express themselves through play.

As I left the PAC last week after listening to all Wagner had to say, I knew for my 4 children, there is no better place than Berrybrook.

Yes, spring has officially arrived but the recent treat of abnormally warm weather has forced more quickly the blooming of flowers and the song of birds to create an array of gorgeous sights and sounds. Just as flowers burst through the earth and buds pop from once bare branches, the Berrybrook children are also springing into spring! This is mainly seen in their friendships.

Friendships go through as many changes and phases as the seasons do throughout the year. At times, friendships have the warmth of love like on the brightest days of summer, the transformation of feelings like the autumn leaves in fall, a gentle peace similar to a blanket of snow in winter and, for certain, great growth as always seen in spring.

Spring is often the time where second year students grow in their friendships by trying out different roles between them. Where one child may have typically held the "follower" role, they now want to try on the hat of "leader". The current "leader" of the friendship may be unfamiliar with this and so communication, empathy and acceptance become valuable life skills that begin to be learned.

First year students may be forming their very first real friendships where they like to do everything together which, in turn, overrides everything else. This strong attraction can cause frustration over not being able to always sit together or feelings of loss when not with that important, kind, understanding friend.

What to do as parents and caregivers? When waiting for a flower to grow, one must have patience. Constant verbal reminders said to an empty pot of soil and seed will not force it to grow. Rather, provide a continuous flow of sunlight, water, love and care, then...pop! It begins to grow...and change...and grow some more...and bloom into something miraculous.

Spring has sprung! Children and their friendships are just like those flowers sprouting from the ground. Keep the sun, water, love, care...and patience coming.

Teachers and staff at Berrybrook are fortunate to see it every year. Yet "it" is never anything less than amazing. Parents have to go through it to see it. Teachers may need to encourage parents to "Hold on" or "Give it time"... and, ultimately, it unfolds. The growth and development in our children, our students, from September to May is astounding. By Ice Cream Day parents see it. Teachers see it. Mrs. Keeley and Mrs. Watts see it. Do the children see it? I believe they do. If they could express it to us this is what they might say:

<u>"I See"</u>

"I see now I can trust."

First year students can now trust that when their caregiver says goodbye they will return. They can trust their emotions. They can feel safe when they are sad, angry or frustrated. They can trust that they will be respected.

Second year students can trust to say goodbye at arrival and they can now walk through any door on their own or with a friend, eager to see what awaits them. They can also trust that new teachers can become just as special as their first teachers.

<u>"I see now I belong."</u>

Both first and second year students realize now that everyone is included and we are all connected here on this earth together. They see the strength when they are together. They see the joy when they are together. Most of all, they see the fun!

"I see now I am a friend."

First year students have learned that being a friend means you may have something in common with another and find comfort together, or have a world of differences between you and learn from each other. Second year students recognize that friendships take communication, patience, and forgiveness and make you a better person for having them.

"I see now I can communicate."

First year students communicate their feelings by learning about their own emotions and they can now listen to others.Second year students can now relate to others with true understanding and compassion. They know that the written word can be just as powerful as the spoken one.

"I see now I can do more than I used to."

First year students may have observed first, then experienced. All of them have practiced first, and then mastered skills for their strong foundation of living and learning.Second year students may have tried something new through the encouragement of a friend. They have strengthened their abilities both mentally and physically to create and imagine more fully.

"I see now I am comfortable being who I am."

First year students make statements such as "I feel", "I think", "I like" and know they are valued and respected. They know their ideas mean something, whether or not they are the same as someone else's. Second year students take the above mentioned and can see how it connects and relates to even more people around them. This adds to their own sense of self, just like when a kaleidoscope is rotated and the small bits and pieces move in a communion of color and light.

"I see now I am ready to move on to what is next for me."

All students are ready to take what they have mastered this year into their next as a foundation upon which to discover more about themselves in relation to others. Like a web of miraculous interaction, as more connections to people are made, more of themselves can they share. Therefore, more of the expression of love, kindness and respect can be brought forth to all around them.

Berrybrook Strategic Plan

The Berrybrook Board of Directors is excited to announce the adoption of a new 5 year Strategic Plan. The plan will guide The Board and administration in improving and expanding our programs, focusing policies and procedures and making greater use of and improvements to the beautiful Berrybrook campus.

The Board formed a committee more than a year ago to evaluate current strengths and weaknesses of the school and its programs as well as the needs of Berrybrook students and families to develop a strategic plan for the future. The committee engaged a consultant, Teresa Goode, Ed D. to facilitate this process. The committee reached out to current and past families, students, board members and teachers as well as members of our larger community to ask for their input. The Board is pleased to to announce the process resulted in an impressive document outlining changes and improvements to the school to be implemented in the next 5 years. The Strategic Plan was formally adopted by the Board on January 11, 2012 and we have just taken the first steps in of our five year timeline.

The work of the Strategic Plan Committee identified three core strategies to be detailed in the plan, Policies and Procedures, Programming and Buildings and Grounds. A highlight of these core strategies is the campus Master Plan which will allow our students and teachers to fully utilize outdoor spaces and enjoy all that the Berrybrook has to offer. The Plan also outlines new and expanded programming for younger children, Summer programs and outside partnerships, as well as surveying parents for scheduling needs.

We are also looking for volunteers help implement the Strategic Plan, please contact the office if you would like to be involved with improving the future of Berrybrook. Copies of the complete 29 page plan are available in the office.
