Notes from the Headmaster

Words are powerful and it is important to choose them carefully. Berrybrook teachers are very aware of the language they use in the classroom. They consciously refrain from using negative words like "*no*" and "*don't*." Our approach is to help children understand what they *can* do, instead of simply what they should *not* do. It takes time and concentration to phrase interactions with children in a positive way, and it takes practice. "We know that when children hear judgement words (nice, good, bad) they often internalize and personalize these words ("That's not nice" is felt as "I'm not nice"). We want to teach and guide - not scold, judge or blame....We know that children have social conflict because they are practicing and learning how to be social (not because they are 'not nice')." - Carol Garboden Murray, January/February 2012, *Creating a Culture that Acknowledges the Power of Words*; Exchange, The Early Childhood Leaders' Magazine.

When Berrybrook teachers facilitate conflict resolution they focus on the situation and the solution - "What is happening?" and "What can we do to solve this problem?" We have found that the most effective way to develop positive behavior is to use positive guidance. This approach has the added benefit of helping children feel lovable and capable. Children may act out for any number of reasons and may also try out negative behavior because of the need to test limits. This is normal behavior at certain stages of development. At Berrybrook, we respect the differences and challenges of developmental stages by offering support and understanding and by using positive language intended to develop respect and empathy. Dr. Lawrence Kutner, well known psychologist and child development expert, believes that intelligence and temperament are largely influenced by genetics, but empathy is a skill that children learn; and he says, "Children who are empathetic tend to do better in school, in social situations, and in their adult careers. Children and teenagers who have the greatest amount of skill at empathy are viewed as leaders by their peers." Berrybrook teachers know that in addition to helping children feel understood, successful and confident, positive responses develop empathy, a skill that will serve children long after their time at Berrybrook. A Springtime Tradition

Painting "blown eggs" is a spring tradition at Berrybrook. Children have been creating these beautiful works of art for many years. It is a precious project that requires help from families. Classrooms need "blown eggs."

If you could donate a few eggs (brown or white) that you have "blown" at home we would appreciate it very much. It is tricky but easy to do. Simply poke a hole in both ends of the egg. A turkey skewer or push pin work well. Each hole should be about the size of a paper punch hole. If you break the yoke it is easier to blow. Blow into one hole and the egg comes out the other. Please rinse egg shell inside and out. Berrybrook teachers will spray the eggs with a bleach solution before children paint them.

Experienced Berrybook parents will tell new parents that the end result is worth the effort. You can send in your blown eggs all month, but we <u>really</u> need them by Friday, March 23. Thank you! Berrybrook Teachers

Parent Discussion Group

DISCIPLINE was the topic discussed on the evening of Wednesday, February 15th. Several Berrybrook parents shared what "discipline" means to them-change, punishment, consequences to choices (logical or natural, removal of privileges), at Berrybrook discipline means "to teach". What are your thoughts? Discipline, as a verb means to change the what, when, where, how and/or why something is done.

If your child is behaving in a manor unacceptable to you try changing your method of discipline. Example: Child getting dressed in the morning. If this is a struggle you may set out "acceptable choices" in the evening, allow your child to choose from your "acceptable choices" of clothing, child must get dressed before another favorable morning activity, compromise, they put one sock on you put the other, etc.

When asked "What brought you to the PDG tonight? Parents responded "How can I do better", "Don't know what to do about...?, "Constantly asking my children to ...?", "I've reached my limit, what to do when children..., "Always nice to get new ideas".

Many new ideas or different ways of parenting are openly and confidentially shared at all Discussion Groups. Parents often comment afterward " I thought I was the only one..."

When it's Wise to Spend, Not Save

"This time like all times is a very good one if we but know what to do with it." - Ralph Waldo Emerson

Although it's only March, planning for the summer and 'next year' and at our house is already in full swing. True it is exciting and important to plan for the future; preparing our children (and ourselves!) to venture a little further from our grasp and ride the school bus for the first time or piecing together the families various summer activities require significant thought and discussion. Inherently, these preparations also mark the end of some of the familiar routines and relationships that we and our children have established over the course of this last school year. This transition too requires our time and careful attention. All this discussion around planning and transitions can leave me a bit overwhelmed! I find myself struggling to achieve a balance between anticipation for the future and living in the quiet, sureness and potential of the very moment at hand. As it is in the present moment that our histories are defined and our futures are shaped.

During a particularly busy study time in college, a friend of mine handed me a copy of *The Tao of Pooh* by Benjamin Hoff. Having nearly mastered the art *and* science of collegiate procrastination, I swiftly set aside my dense philosophy texts and dove into the world of Pooh. Not more than a few minutes into *The Tao*, a line jumped out at me and has lingered quietly with me since "The main problem with this great obsession for saving time is very simple: you can't save time. You can only spend it. But you can spend it wisely or foolishly." Although I felt conflicted about setting aside my intended studies for a bit, to engage in 'fun' reading, the unanticipated words of wisdom I encountered have become an enduring gift. It seems like a long time ago since I read *The Tao of Pooh*, and life now with four children appears quite different than the less moment-to-moment days before parenthood. Yet, regardless of our phase in life, the significance of *how* we spend our time and what we glean from it remains.

Here we are in March 2012. I, for one, am a bit thrown off by the mild winter we've enjoyed so far. On the one hand it's been wonderful to get outdoors so much at this time of year without the multiple layers and accessories typically associated with winters in New England. But, on the other hand, I feel slightly confused that spring is coming so soon. I keep asking myself "did February *really* happen yet?" Of course, I worry what this holds for our spring and summer months. Here I go, anticipating the future again . . . Given I don't have any control over the weather, I guess it's up to me to enjoy it for what it is: A mild forgiving winter. Spending time worrying about what it potentially means for the spring or fretting over the lack of snow to sled and ski on won't alter the opportunity to enjoy its benefits today.

Over the last several months since the school year started, we have watched our children grow and learn and forge friendships. We ourselves have learned a bit more about parenting and navigating its waters. As we approach the last phase of this school year, it will be a time to take stock of all that has occurred over the past year and to anticipate what lies ahead. Somewhere in between all of the planning will be our opportunity to define and shape *this* moment by how we choose to 'spend' our time. Whatever the circumstances of the present moment call for – laughter, thankfulness, bravery, forgiveness, decisiveness, compassion – the opportunity lies in this very moment to make choices that endear the past and usher in enthusiasm for tomorrow. One definition of the word "stretch" is: "to extend over a given period of time" (<u>www.freedictionary.com/stretch</u>). The Berrybrook children have been doing just that, the entire school year, in three major areas...body, mind and soul.

Physically, it's easy to see the changes. Second year students now have that "kindergartener" look as their faces have matured to reflect their more mature thinking. First year students no longer hold the "toddler face" that was captured in the first day of school photographs hanging on their class bulletin board. Taller and stronger, all students demonstrate their physical growth daily. Ms. Caddle's wonderful instruction in yoga continues this journey. Yoga for children has many benefits such as "encouraging self-esteem and body awareness with physical activity that's non-competitive...(and) fosters cooperation and compassion instead of opposition. (It helps to) develop an intimate world around them." (www.yogajournal.com/lifestyle/210)

Yoga also helps to stretch the minds of children. "Yoga ... (is) a springboard for exploration of many other areas: animal adaptations and behavior, music and playing instruments, storytelling, and drawing..." (www.yogajournal.com/lifestyle/210) In the classroom, children's minds are growing in their thinking in many ways. New stories are being experienced, exploring more complex characters and plots. New challenges in writing are being met. First year students who used a "mark" to once represent their name now do so with letters. Those who were already capable of writing their name now have moved on to include important names of friends and family. Second year students whose letter writing occupied a large space on paper now have letters resting left to right, perhaps on a line. Drawings now show more detail and often tell a story. Another important stretch in a child's thinking is their understanding of friendship. A tower of experiences has now been built that is reflected in conversations heard among friends. In a first year classroom, words said in the Block Area may be "We can build it together! Just be careful so it stays up, ok?" In the Dramatic Play Area it might be announced, "We can BOTH be the Mommy!" Second year students are overheard having increasingly sophisticated conversations, compared to those in the fall, to resolve problems that can span over time, "Well, vesterday / had a turn with it, so today you can have it, and tomorrow she can!" Conversations like these are usually followed with clapping hands and smiling faces symbolizing agreement among all parties involved!

Finally, stretching of the soul is easy to do at Berrybrook. Ms. Caddle accomplishes this in yoga as "the physical movements introduce kids to yoga's true meaning: union, expression and honor for oneself and one's part in the delicate web of life." (www.yogajournal.com/lifestyle/210). I believe that one of the greatest needs of a child's soul is a sense of belonging. Children get that need met at Berrybrook when they feel accepted and respected by their peers and teachers. I also believe that one of the greatest lessons for children is knowing that even when they are angry, frustrated, hurt or sad the people in their lives (friends, family, teachers) continue to love them and will remember that we are all learning.

One of the favorite art mediums we use at Berrybrook is called Gooey Gunk. When left alone and untouched it stays as it is, a blob-like structure, unmoving. Once touched and gently handled it can stretch to its ultimate gooey-goodness! Visualize Gooey Gunk to help you remember that every single day is another opportunity to stretch our bodies, minds and souls. Not just *our* bodies, minds and souls but those of our *children*. Keep Stretching!!!
