## Enrollment 2013-2014

All first year families should have received enrollment information over our holiday break. January is the month reserved for all current and alumni families to enroll at Berrybrook for the 2013-2014 school year. The second year program offers one 5 Day morning group and two 4 Day afternoon groups. When submitting an application, parents should circle their program preference. The placement of children into classes is a process which takes into account individual needs of children, balance in the composition of each class and parent preference. While we would like to honor every preference, space or other factors may limit the number of children assigned to an individual class.

#### Second Year Program News

Welcome back! We hope you all had a happy, healthy and safe break and enjoyed your holiday celebrations. As the New Year is upon us, so is the chillier weather. We have planned some wonderful activities for January. We will begin our discussions of cold weather, snow, wind chill factors, and most importantly, how to dress appropriately for the cold weather. We encourage the children to dress all by themselves. This includes zippers, snaps and buttons. It is helpful for the children to practice getting dressed at home and we thank you for encouraging them to do so. They feel very proud to be able to zip, snap, and button by themselves! We also ask that you send them to school every day with boots, snow pants, hats, and mittens/gloves. We try to spend a part of everyday outside, even if it is for a short period of time.

#### **BPA Dues!**



## **Berrybrook Book Review**

*The Way of Boys – Raising Healthy Boys in a Challenging and Complex World by* Anthony Rao, Ph.D.

As a mother of two young boys, I always love reading about practical advice that calms my motherly nerves. The chapter headings are completely relatable, enticing you to read them, including: Your Problem is Spelled B-O-Y, Little Girls Aren't Like This, He Doesn't Have Any Friends, He's A Bully, He Won't Sit Still, He Runs the Household, He Has to Win or Else, He Wants to Be the Bad Guy, He's Suddenly Fragile, He's Already Been Labeled, and more.

Being part advice and part expose, the reader is able to relate to various stories about other families. One of his first points that hit home for me as a teacher was the mother that said her days were filled with anxiety about what her son may do next, something that teachers hear quite often. Parents want the absolute best for their children, which often results in the many hours of agonizing internally over the smallest behavioral details and what we can do as parents to make it better. Something I am completely guilty of!

One of the first points the author made was in regards to today's culture, faster pace = higher demands. He stated "We're rushing kids through their childhood, as the pace to keep up and compete with one another increases. The stress of our high expectations trickles down, and our young boys feel it the most. We're expecting too much from them, to sit, listen, and use social skills that won't be fully developed until they reach the second grade. The result? Greater numbers of boys aren't keeping up, are overloaded with stress, and are acting out in frustration". I must take a minute to commend Berrybrook from my parental standpoint, as we are so fortunate that these cultural pressures are left at the door for our children to focus on the true essence of preschool, exploration and socialization. We have all heard the statement "play is the child's work", in which the author adds that even when children are playing alone they begin to learn basic social skills, through listening and watching others around them and by picking up social patterns of people in the room with them.

I must admit, my favorite chapter was *He won't Sit Still*, the story of my life! The first question is how to burn off a boy's excess energy. A generation ago, children were sent outside to play and were expected to stay out there for hours on end. But in today's society, parents feel and need to keep a much closer eye on their children. The trouble is, parents do not have hours on end to supervise their child's play. Preschoolers wind up getting all their physical activity in short bursts of supervised time at a playground or during athletic lessons, all which typically last less than an hour. One tip is that parents should give boys a chance to expend energy while developing a sense of humor about strange behavior, for example crab walking around the house. Once you have given your son the opportunity to burn off excess energy, then you can focus on teaching him when and how to sit still. Practice because it is a skill. Remember, curiosity and creativity are the driving force for most movements.

This book consistently provided mini headings throughout each chapter, touching upon almost all behavior traits of boys, while providing feedback in attempts to answer questions from all angles. The author's stories and insights provide a better path of understanding when raising our young sons, encouraging proud parents for the exciting journey of child rearing!
