On the last two days of February Claire Reilly came to Berrybrook to visit all of our classes and talked to the children about dental hygiene. Mrs. Reilly is a great fit for Berrybrook. She is warm, engaging and brings along a great variety of materials; from some actual tools dentists use, to puppets with extraordinarily large teeth that children take turns brushing with with really big toothbrushes! Her presentation meshes well with our Berrybrook philosophy - "discover, play, learn." This enrichment program, like all of the others at Berrybrook was organized and funded by our Berrybrook Parents Association. The BPA manages all of their activities by asking each family for a minimal annual dues and by charging a small admission fee to our fun filled Harvest Festival. Every penny the BPA raises goes directly to enrichment programs and other activities that benefit every single member of our community. We are so thankful for all of the parents who volunteer in classrooms, participate in birthday celebrations, collect recyclables, cook, sew and donate items for projects. ### First Year Program News

February was a month that seemed to fly by in the blink of an eye! At Berrybrook, the first year classes were able to enjoy many activities between the snowflakes! We celebrated Valentine's Day, worked in the Berrybrook post office and visited the US Post Office in Duxbury!

As we head into March, first year students will be involved in many different topics including transportation, Dr. Seuss, and the coming of spring. March gives us the opportunity to explore the color green. For St. Patrick's Day. Classes will be making a special snack and creating projects to celebrate the special day. We also will be on the look out for a change of the weatherwarmer days accompanied by cold nights will signal the start of maple sugaring season - an other tradition at Berrybrook. We will tap our own tree and see the sap drip into the bucket. The sap will then be boiled into syrup, and enjoyed as part of a special treat!

Math, Science, Literacy, Social Studies and Health are all part of the interconnected curriculum at Berrybrook. Classrooms and activities are arranged to include all of these important areas, but also included are interactions to help children develop social skills. Our classrooms and curriculum promote a sense of empathy and community, and conflicts between children are seen as opportunities for helping children become sensitive human beings. We help children develop empathy by being active listeners. We model good listening and encourage children to listen to each other. We suggest that they look directly at each other when they have something to say. When children know

they will be listened to, they are more apt to listen to someone else.

Children are able to recite many ways to be kind and good to friends. Intellectually, they know the right choices, but developmentally, they are just beginning to put them into practice. It is our pleasure to provide them with opportunities to practice these important social skills. It is so important for teachers and parents to remember that children are learning from us in our daily interactions - in the ways we treat and speak to them and others. The manner in which we handle difficult situations or problems will determine how they will respond to a similar situation in their future.

At Berrybrook, we believe that children learn everywhere and at all times. Teachers see even the tiniest incident as an opportunity to help a child learn something about the world or themselves.

Watch for parent-teacher conference sign ups in your child's classroom during the month of March. We look forward to talking with you about the growth in your child.

#### Second Year Program News

February with all its weather and power related challenges is in the past! Last month, we were very busy with our Valentine projects and celebrations, and other February activities included lessons about nutrition and health. The hospital set up in our dramatic play area was very well received by our students who spent lots of time taking good care of babies, animals and each other.

March has us looking forward to spring, and many of our favorite Berrybrook traditions. For St. Patricks Day we will be preparing our Berrybrook Irish Soda bread, as we learn about Ireland. The children will listen to Irish music and try to dance the Irish Jig. Another of our traditions is the painting of blown eggs. We ask parents to supply the eggs, and we appreciate the time and patience required to prepare the eggs for the children to paint. The end result is fabulous. Spring is on its way and we will be learning new spring time songs, and observing nature for its first signs of spring.

When the conditions are just right, (warm days, cold nights) we will be tapping the maple trees. The children with their classes gather outside to watch the sap drip from the Norway Maple trees into special buckets. Once the buckets are full, the sap is boiled into syrup. We will then read *Sugar on Snow* by Nancy Dingman Watson and have our sugar on snow party. (The "sugar" is maple syrup and the "snow" is vanilla ice cream.) Also this month we will be studying planets, space, and phases of the moon. We have interesting projects the children will be busy working on during this time. Note: Watch for the full moon on March 27.

The children are now beginning to have that more mature, "kindergarten look" to them and they delight in exploring in all areas of the curriculum and classroom. Learning is fostered through ideas in math, science, social studies, art and music on a daily basis. Social interactions among peers are enjoyable and satisfying. The children have built their skills of expressing their feelings and being good listeners!

Time for us to leave winter behind and welcome spring with all its wonder.

## A Spring Tradition



Painting "blown eggs"

is a spring tradition at Berrybrook. Children have been creating these beautiful works of art for many years. It is a precious project that requires help from families.

All classrooms need "blown eggs."

If you could donate a few eggs (brown or white) that you have "blown" at home we would appreciate it very much. Simply poke a hole in both ends of the egg. A turkey skewer or push pin work well. Each hole should be about the size of a paper punch hole. If you break the yoke it is easier to blow. Blow into one hole and the egg comes out the other. Please rinse egg shell inside and out. Berrybrook teachers will spray the eggs with a bleach solution before children paint them. Experienced Berrybook parents will tell new parents that the end result is worth the effort.

The blown eggs can be sent in whenever they are ready, but we <u>really</u> need them by Friday, March 14.

#### Parent Discussion Group

On the eve of the 2013 blizzard, a small group gathered at Berrybrook to explore early childhood friendships. This intimate group shared and expanded our knowledge of how preschoolers perceive "friendship". Preschoolers understand friendship as the child who is beside them now. For example, John is my friend. He sat next to me at circle

time. Sally is my friend because she painted at the easel with me. They may even make statements such as I'm not Karen's friend because she played with Alicia." On the surface, this may seem unkind, but in reality, we understand that Karen and Alicia were physically together and not next to the child who made this statement. As preschoolers gain more experience in the social world, they begin to understand and sort out the qualities about children, which they find appealing. During the prekindergarten year, children begin to understand that I wish to be Darren's friend because we both like to play with Legos. Karen likes to swing and so do I. Children begin to seek out friends who exhibit the qualities they like.

As parents and teachers, we help children navigate through the friendship process. As adults, we can support children's choices by engaging children in play dates. It is important to respect *their* choice of who they want to invite for a playdate. Supervision during play sessions is important, and keeping initial play dates short is often more beneficial. It is valuable to end on a positive note rather than having a longer play date that might end with frustration!

The book was an easy, comfortable, reflective and informative read. Each chapter has words of advice. However, if you are unable to read the entire book, simply choose the chapter that appeals to you.
