Berrybrook Book Review

The Six Stages of Parenthood by Ellen Galinsky

Almost all books for parents focus on the way children develop. Ellen Galinsky, instead, writes about how parents develop. Drawing on the work in adult development of Erik Erikson and Daniel Levinson, she describes six distinct stages in the life of a parent: the image-making that occurs during pregnancy; the nurturing role that swallows parents up from birth through the first couple of years; the authority parents must develop as small children show independence; the interpretive stage when parents explain the world and their values to school-age children; the interdependent stage when teenagers challenge authority; and the departure years when parents let go and take stock of their accomplishments and failures. Few parents will be able to resist tracing their own passages with help of this book, and all those who do will find new insight and enjoyment at each stage.

Parenting is a process by which parents and children grow and develop, influencing each other throughout their lives. According to Galinsky's book, *The Six stages of Parenthood*, parents move through a series of six stages from pregnancy to the time when their child leaves home to enter the adult world, and parents assess their success as a parent during each of these stages.

Ellen Galinsky interviewed over 200 couples discovering that expectations for their child's behavior and development are measured against the child's actual behavior and development. A parents self-image may shift as he or she moves through the different stages of parenthood. For better or for worse, being a parent changes an individual forever. During the image making stage (pregnancy) parents prepare for changes in themselves, for new relationships with each other, and the responsibilities of this new life. The nurturing stage (18-24 months) is marked by forming bonds of attachment with the baby. Parents attempt to meet the needs of the child while also trying to balance other responsibilities involving their spouse, jobs, and friends. During the authoritative stage (ages 2-4) parents nurture, guide, and discipline their child. Parents evaluate their effectiveness in establishing limits, communicating and enforcing rules, and allowing enough freedom for each child to grow and develop. The Interpretive stage (preschool years through adolescence), the Interdependent stage (during adolescence), and the departure stage all provide a wealth of knowledge and research on parenthood.

I think one of the great bits of knowledge to pull from this book is that we must realize that as a parent we have "images" of what our child will look like, behave like, talk like etc. but that our images may not be the reality. To be happy, you can either change reality to meet that image, or change your image to be more realistic. There were many interviews that I found interesting and informative and they reinforce the idea that we grow as an individual during parenting. I would recommend *The Six Stages of Parenthood* especially to new parents but I think it has quite a bit to offer to any parent in any stage of parenthood. The book itself seems a bit overwhelming at first with its tiny textbook like print, bibliography, and notes. It is not necessarily what I would call an "easy read" although not a difficult read either. Either way it *IS* worth your attention.
