

# Notes from the Head of School

This time of year, the children are feeling very comfortable with each other. They have been spending time together for six months now, and have formed many close friendships. These first friendships are very important to children and they provide opportunities for many happy days. However, as children grow closer, these same friendships provide the opportunity for hurt feelings. After all, a mere acquaintance can snub you and you hardly notice - only close friends possess the power to really hurt your feelings. To a child, having a friend sit next to someone else at circle time can be devastating. At Berrybrook, we spend a good deal of our time helping children manage these delicate relationships. Encouraging children to develop empathy for others is one of the most challenging jobs of the preschool teacher. Four and five year olds are just starting to learn that their actions may have an impact on someone else.

One of the ways we help children develop empathy is by being active listeners. We model good listening and encourage them to listen to each other. We suggest that they look directly at each other when they have something to say. We encourage responses that include how they feel about things. When children know they will be listened to, they are more likely to listen to someone else.

If you ask them, children know many ways to be kind and good to friends. Intellectually, they know the right choices, but developmentally, they are just beginning to put them into practice. It is our job to provide them with opportunities to demonstrate how kind they are. Berrybrook teachers design their classrooms and curriculum to promote a sense of empathy and community, and conflicts between children are seen as opportunities for helping children become sensitive human beings.

Teachers respond to hurt feelings with compassion. They listen. They ask for details and, if necessary, they help children express themselves to their friends.

I thought it was important for me to let parents know how we deal with hurt feelings and how much time we spend doing it. It is a big part of our day, especially at this time of year when true friendships begin to bloom. I have said before that Berrybrook is a wonderful school with beautiful surroundings and wonderful traditions. Our tradition of creating an empathetic, respectful environment for children is our most important.

# **Family Matters**

The new *Family Matters* link on our school website is available for all parenting questions and comments. Teachers are happy to do research and gather resources for families looking for information about early childhood situations. All information and comments are responded to in a totally anonymous format. Below are some recent questions:

### Dear Family Matters,

Hello, Our daughter is typically delighted to go to school each day, always speaking well of her friends and teachers. Lately, she says "I don't want to go to school today. I don't like it anymore." Please help, we are worried about her.

Response: We understand and sympathize with the concern you have about your daughter's sudden change in how she views school. Thanks so much for your question, as others reading this will surely benefit. Please know that it is completely normal and expected that some days children may say they don't want to go to school and not be able to completely understand or verbalize a reason why. Just as it is impossible for adults to be happy all the time, every single day, the same holds true for children. Children are just beginning to understand emotions, therefore their own emotions will be verbalized in ways such as "I don't want to go to school", "He's not coming to my birthday party", "Nobody wants to play with me", and so on. It can be similar to deciphering a code.

For example,

"He's not coming to my birthday party" *may mean...* My friend sat next to someone else at snack time today.

"Nobody wants to play with me" *may mean...* Friends are starting to branch out and I don't know how to join others in play.

"I don't want to go to school" *may mean...* My friend was absent yesterday and I'm worried my friend won't be there today.

It is always important to mention your child's concerns to their teachers so they can help, too. Information you give teachers can help them to be better detectives as they observe and talk with your child throughout the day at school. Also, as worrisome as it may be when your child has feelings of not wanting to go to school, you are their ultimate role model. Validate them so they know their feelings are recognized and their words are heard but remind them that you, along with their teachers, can always help solve any problem together with them. Children need to know that they have power over their problems, feelings and emotions. As they grow, they will be practicing how to have control over their worries or fears and not be overwhelmed by them. When they are an active part in the solution to a problem or concern, they will then feel empowered.

Dear Family Matters, I appreciate this opportunity to touch base with Berrybrook on a situation that has developed at our house. We have a 4 and a 6 year old, and a 6 month old. During dinner the 4 year old tries/ succeeds to dominate the entire dinner time conversation. We have tried reminding her to wait her turn, allowing her to talk first, etc. No luck! Any ideas?

Response: All children need to be heard, some more than others! Find time to talk, or should we say listen, to the 4 year old at another time in your day. Give her your full attention even if for a short time, and if possible, jot down her thoughts... validating is so important to us all! At the dinner table, its important to model respect for the thoughts of others, "Your words and ideas are very important and I want to hear them. Now, let's hear what dad has to say about that subject." While listening to others your 4 year old could finish her ziti - something to keep her mouth busy. Eating dinner together as a family has many proven benefits, including better grades and social skills. In time, your talker will mature when it comes to dinner conversation!

# Berrybrook Book Review Joanne LaForest

<u>The Parent Backpack for Kindergarten Through Grade 5</u>- How to Support Your Child's Education, End Homework Meltdowns, and Build Parent-Teacher Connections; ML Nichols 2013

At Berrybrook, children in the 4 and 5 Day Classes will soon begin talking about visiting kindergarten. Although they won't be bringing their backpacks to kindergarten as of yet, ML Nichols writes about everything *parents* will need in their "backpacks" upon starting their voyage to elementary school. A voyage of sorts it is, where she says, "our role as parents - to guide, support and nurture...values and skills as we walk along the bank of our children's river of learning – is critical." (p.18).

Nichols has provided a heartfelt abundance of helpful information which she acquired from her thorough interviews with teachers and parents, in addition to her very active involvement in her children's education. By participating in everything from the PTA to volunteering on many levels, she found to be true what she suggests to all parents: being actively involved in your child's education makes your bond with them tremendously strong. She also cofounded **The Parent Connection**, a non-profit organization here on the South Shore that educates parents.

Her book outlines beautifully all the areas that affect a successful elementary school experience. From understanding the importance of social-emotional development, identifying our role as parents to be sure children can *apply* what they learn in school, how to effectively communicate with teachers, to handling homework, organization and the overall well-being of our children, including nutrition – Nichols has given a "backpack" that parents who have already gone through the elementary years with their children only *wish* they had owned (like me!).

There was great validation as a Berrybrook teacher with which I walked away from this book, as it applies to the here and now of how we prepare families for what awaits them beyond Berrybrook: the skills necessary for children to be successful. Nichols writes, "The Partnership for 21<sup>st</sup> Century Skills (P21), a think tank focused on the future of education, has...identified four core skills that students need to succeed in this millennium...

- Creativity and Innovation (The ability to think outside the lines)
- Critical Thinking and Problem Solving (Turning our kids into thinkers)
- Collaboration (Working with others effectively)
- Communication (Writing, listening and speaking well)

...and are the goals of readiness for college, career, and citizenship...that begin in kindergarten..." (p.208)

I believe the above goals begin in preschool, for these are the same goals reflected in the vision that Mrs. Mann held for Berrybrook almost 60 years ago. ML Nichols captures the essence of supporting your child's education throughout this book...in a very "Berrybrook" way. Not surprising; the Nichols family attended Berrybrook years ago!

Hello! My mom told me that you have been eagerly waiting for news about the Jumpstart book drive. Berrybrook families and teachers have donated so many books over the past three years, thank you so much for your help!
Jumpstart is a leading nonprofit organization dedicated to ensuring that every child in America enters school prepared to succeed. Corps Members work with low-income preschoolers twice a week for two hours at Head Start schools in Taunton and Brockton. Jumpstart at Bridgewater State University is again holding the now annual book drive this year. The classroom libraries at the Head Start schools are often sparse because books are expensive, lost, or read so often that they fall apart. At home most of the low-income preschoolers unfortunately only have a few, if any, books. Jumpstart at Bridgewater State serves about 240 preschool children in the Brockton and Taunton areas. It is our hope that with this book drive we will be able to donate a few books to each of the classrooms and send each Jumpstart child home with several books as well.

I volunteered with Jumpstart for the past four years and absolutely loved every minute of it! I can tell you from witnessing it firsthand that these books will be loved and cherished by the extremely excited children who receive them. Unfortunately, I could not volunteer with Jumpstart this year because I am completing my student teaching in order to graduate in May. I started the book drive three years ago and I am ecstatic that the now annual book drive will continue even though I am not a current Jumpstart volunteer! Berrybrook has graciously participated in the book drive for the past three years and I would love for that tradition to continue as it not only helps less privileged preschoolers but is also a great learning experience for the wonderful Berrybrook kids.

We are looking to collect gently used preschool aged books for the Jumpstart Head Start classrooms and the Jumpstart children. There is of course no obligation to donate books or go out and buy new books. Thank you in advanced for your help!
