# Notes from the Head of School

Dr. Edward M. Hallowell, Child Psychiatrist and author of <u>The Childhood Roots of Adult</u> <u>Happiness: Five Steps to Help Kids Create and Sustain Lifelong Joy</u>, advises parents to have fun with their children, let them follow their own dreams, encourage them to play sports, read aloud to them for as long as they will let you, make family dinners part of your routine, and create family traditions. In Chapter 8 of his book, *Play: The Source of Lifelong Joy*, Dr. Hallowell states, "The reason to encourage children to play is not merely that play is a wonderful end in itself---although it is that. As a child plays, he learns a special skill---the skill of play---and it is a skill that is more useful than any other. The skill of play, of being able to make creative use of time no matter where you are or what you are doing, is the skill that lies behind all discoveries, all advances, all creative activity. If you can play, you will always have a chance to be happy and to do something great."

Early childhood experts agree that play-based learning is developmentally appropriate for young children. To promote play in the face of increasing emphasis on academic instruction for younger and younger children is a challenge. At Berrybrook, we champion constructive play, a natural activity fueled by a child's inborn curiosity and disposition to learn. Through play, children increase their knowledge of the world around them and have opportunities to practice language, mathematical and motor skills while absorbing concepts and building skills at a pace that is right for them. Children have the chance to make their own decisions about what to do next, and with whom.

Play and academics are not mutually exclusive. It's not Play **vs.** Learning, it's Play **and** Learning. At Berrybrook, play based learning is balanced with direct instruction, guided play and scaffolding, where teachers structure activities to build skills in all areas. Last month, teachers in both of our afternoon classes set the stage for block building in the hallway. Practically every single block from both rooms came out! The children created a "road" that went from our back door to the multipurpose room. The curiosity, creativity and team work that the children demonstrated was encouraged and supported by the teachers. What valuable lessons the children learned, such as – observations are important, everyone's ideas and suggestions can help, some problems do not have instant solutions, people can find resources to help them solve a problem, - roads need rules to keep everyone safe! The road building in our hallway is just one example of hundreds of situations that arise every day where teachers allow the children the joy of discovery. These wonderful moments happen all the time and everywhere at Berrybrook...

and families can help to promote healthy play at home...

**Provide opportunities to play with peers** - Children develop better, more sophisticated social strategies when they are able to maintain relationships with other children they like over long periods of time.

**Play with children in a peer-like way.** - Parents of the most socially competent children laugh and smile often, avoid criticizing their child during play, and are responsive to the child's ideas and aren't too directive.

**Endorse positive, relevant strategies.** - Parents of competent children talk about various options, but endorse friendly, prosocial strategies that leave the door open to play or friendship. Children react more positively to peers who try to solve problems by negotiation or compromise rather than tattling, aggression or verbal coercion.

**Reflect a positive, resilient attitude toward social setbacks.** - Exclusion by peers is sometimes a fact of life for preschoolers. Parents of socially competent children endorse interpretations of social events that encourage resilient, constructive attitudes and encourage children to take an optimistic view of others and themselves as play partners. They reflect an upbeat, resilient attitude toward social setbacks and the belief that situations can be improved with effort and positive behavior.

Berrybrook teachers do not write a script for their students. They encourage children to engage in the curriculum around their own interests. The constructive play that happens here stimulates children to build positive relationships with their teachers and peers while developing their own special personality and sense of self. We know play inspires creativity, stirs the imagination and presents endless opportunities for meaningful problem solving. Our environments and activities support this philosophy, and at Berrybrook, our teachers have enthusiasm and respect for the children's ideas, choices and style. They believe that healthy, constructive non-violent play-based learning is the best way for young children to learn in all academic areas. They also know how important children's peer relationships are for their development and adjustment to school. We know that if we can build social competence in preschool, there will be a better transition into kindergarten and a better opportunity for life-long happiness. The Beginners Class would like to thank the Berrybrook Parents Association for the enrichment programs we enjoyed last month. We had fun keeping the beat with Tony from All Hands Drumming.There were so many percussion instruments and we made so much noise! On another visit to the Big Room we had a relaxing time practicing Yoga with Miss Kim. Thank you, BPA!

Children have been learning all year that friends can talk to each other, listen to each other and even share with each other by understanding that everyone's feelings are important, including their own. February is a natural time to extend our understanding of Friendship. The Dramatic Play Area will become a Post Office where lots of emerging writing skills will be practiced in meaningful ways when children "write" notes to friends and family. We will sing songs about all the people and pets we love and have a Valentine's Day celebration.

As a reminder, on Friday February 13, children may bring in simple valentines *without food or non-food items attached* to deliver to their friends during class time with their teachers. For ease of delivery, *please do not individually address valentines.* We will have a special Valentine's Day snack as well! Fun!

Many golden minutes are bound up in this book; Along with special memories of our time at Berrybrook. Our year began in Autumn and making Beach plum jam. We got acquainted in the playground crying "Catch me if you can." We learned about the Pilgrims, even dressing up as they; We gave thanks around our tables, preparing for Thanksgiving Day. In December we had a pageant each day as we recall, Jesus, Mary, Joseph--we took turns and played them all. Some of us were donkeys, some wise men, some were sheep; We delighted in the caroling--oh, these memories we'll keep. As Christmas Day got nearer, a Christmas tree we picked; We cut it down and set it up, our ornaments befitting it. Our memories continued weaving on a spinning wheel; A spinner showed us how to spin- with pedal and our heel. There was magic, oh, such wonder, all the sights our eyes have seen; Our teachers, oh we'll miss you--our guiding light is what you've been. We've tapped trees for maple syrup, we've grown marigolds from seed, We've fed our birds our pine cone goodies; we've painted eggs for Easter trees. At the most recent board meeting, we had a discussion about some of the supplies that

the teachers needed. One of the things that the teachers were requesting was new record players! I'm not sure how we even go about finding a record player (luckily Mrs. Keeley knows just where to get them), but I love that even with all the modern technology available and our state of the art building. I like that "simple" is usually viewed as better. I love that my children go on nature walks and learn about the environment around them. I love that each of my children has had a unique and special experience at Berrybrook- yet each of them has made homemade jelly, tapped the maple tree, made pine cone bird feeders, have gone to Plimoth Plantation and made a similar but different Plimoth Plantation diorama, participated in a Thanksgiving Feast, made potato latkes and cookies during the holidays, learned how to spin wool and paint blown eggs in the Spring. I love that when my current preschooler tells us about his day, his older siblings will often say, " I remember doing that...that was so much fun!" We just enrolled our youngest of four children in the Beginners Program for next year. It is such a bittersweet experience to be so grateful that he too can experience everything the older kids have-but yet... it will be our last few years being an active Berrybrook family. I hope that you and your children have had as many amazing memories and experiences behind the wooden gate as our family has.
