Just this morning, I was popping in and out of one classroom to help as needed because we had a teacher absent who was ill and we had another teacher in a parent/teacher conference. They are

I am thankful that the Berrybrook teachers, who upon learning that a coworker may need to miss school, pitch in to help without a second thought.

#### Beginners Notes Outside Play spaces



The daily routine for the Beginners Class is becoming familiar. From arrival to dismissal, children are relaxing into and trusting the predictability of the day, anticipating group times and wondering, "What will the story be about today?" or "What song will we all sing together?"

One of the most anticipated times of the day is our Outdoor Playtime. The Courtyard Area has been our most visited outdoor space since September, and for good reason. It is smaller than the Big Playground, offers a very large sand space which is conducive to the developmental level of Beginners, and has a grass area for gross motor play. The beach plum bushes from which we picked the beach plums, has now become a "forest" to explore, a "jungle" where the dinosaurs live, a "hiding place" to play the "Boo Game" (created by the children!) and a fun place to go in and out of together. We have added different elements to the Courtyard Area such as coupe cars, brooms, dinosaurs, dump trucks, a variety of bakeware for sand pies and cakes, and a variety of large containers about which we ask the children, "How can you make these heavy?" and they get right to work filling them up!

We most recently have begun visiting The Nook! The Beginners listen very well during our travels down to this amazing outdoor space, remembering : "Who's in the front? ('a teacher!')...Who's in the back? ('a teacher!') ...and who are in the middle? ('the children!')" Down in the Nook the children can freely explore music, build with natural materials, create imaginary spaces with large fabric pieces on the platform, balance, dig, water the plants and bushes....and enjoy being one with nature!

This month we will continue to visit The Nook weekly while also exploring the Rocket Ship Playground. This play area adds to imaginary play with the rocket and small house (which always seems to miraculously transform into an Ice Cream Shop!) and allows other equipment to be brought in such as rakes and wheelbarrows and our horizontal metal climbing ladder to strengthen large body muscles.

Berrybrook is filled with many beautiful play areas, each with its own unique purpose. Thank you for understanding the reasons why we as Beginners move from one area to the next.

We look forward to welcoming Elise and Collin to the Beginners Class this month! They will surely learn about our daily routine as well. It won't take them long to figure out what the current Beginners already know: "After we come in from Outside Time it's always Snack Time!" Proof that every "time" of the day is important!

#### First Year Project Notes Pinecone Turkey



In November, the first year program moves from talking about friends to adding in family. Families will be asked to send in pictures of your child's family to display in the class, showing that although we are individual families, we are also part of our Berrybrook family. Families will also be asked to work together as a family to decorate a feather for our class turkey. Speaking of turkeys, a traditional Berrybrook project that we will focus on is the pinecone turkey.

Taking the pinecone turkey as a theme, here is how it looks as a cross curricular learning unit.

**Language Arts**- We will read "Thanks for Thanksgiving" by Julie Markes. The children will work together at circle to create a list of things that we are grateful for.

**Mathematics**- At circle, we will sing 5 Little Turkeys, practice counting feathers and categorizing them by their attributes (color, shape, size).

**Science**- We will discuss a turkey's natural habitat. (Lucky for us, we see them out our classroom windows on the playground often at this time of year!)

**Social Studies**- With the holiday season approaching, lots of talk will happen both in large and small groups. We will discuss similarities, differences and traditions, which will often be seen through dramatic play in our housekeeping area.

**Art**- Children will create a turkey by gluing feathers into a pinecone (just think Thanksgiving table centerpiece!)

The first year program is looking forward to hearing more about your families and holiday traditions!

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#### **Kingston Animal Shelter Donations**

November brings an annual Berrybrook Community Service Project started by Mrs. O'Neil many years ago. Families may bring in donations of supplies needed to benefit the Kingston animal shelter. To receive these donations, boxes will be decorated by the children with cut-out pictures of dogs, cats, and other animals glued onto a colorful background. These boxes will be placed in the lobby and near classroom doors along with "Pennies For The Pound Jars". There will be class discussions about "What is an animal shelter?", "Adoption of pets", and "Being respectful of all living things." It is important for all children to develop empathy and practice kindness. Taking care of pets and other animals is a meaningful way for children to develop these traits.

## Second Year Project Notes Spider Study



Children in the 4 and 5 day classes enjoy the benefit of working on a project over the course of several days, or even weeks. They have the ability to stay focused longer on their task, and therefore enjoy projects with more than one-step.

The Five Day Class have already worked on an extensive project, which began when one of the children found a spider crawling in the housekeeping area. We took this opportunity to examine the spider in a bug catcher. Children took turns in small groups looking at the details of the spider. They then used magnifying glasses to get a better look at those details. Next, they drew a picture of what they saw.

One day we looked at spider webs. Photographs showed several different types of webs that spiders build. Next, the children used a painting technique called marble painting, to make their own version. We used a stand up weaving loom to create a class spider web with yarn. Down in the NOOK we searched for and found several different kinds of spiders. We compared the details of each, marking their similarities and difference.

As the interest in spiders continued, we made spiders with tissue paper and pipe cleaners. Then we read an African folk tale from the Ashanti people entitled, <u>Anansi</u>. Anansi means spider. These stories provide many lessons for the reader. Anansi is described as a foolish spider, who can change his shape.

We even learned to sing the song, The Eensy Weensy Spider in Spanish.

The most exciting aspect of this spider study is that children initiated it. They found the first spider, and began to talk about spiders. Their discussions helped to create the direction that the project took.

Children practiced observation skills, as they described details of the living spider. They increased their vocabulary, as we named the parts of the spider's body. When drawing their version of the spider, they transferred an idea onto paper.

Math skills were involved in counting the legs for the spiders. Fine motor development was involved in learning to twist the pipe cleaners around the tissue paper to make the spider.

When we read <u>Anansi</u>, and learned to sing in Spanish, they explored other cultures.

They created spider webs in two different ways. One was a solo art project; the second was a group project that involved planning, cooperating and helping each other. This was also a three dimensional project.

The most important and valuable aspect of this study was FUN!

## From The Board of Directors

#### Learning at Berrybrook: Building a Growth Mindset

One of the ways teachers at Berrybrook support children's growth is by expecting and encouraging children to do things independently. On the playground and in the classroom, this cornerstone of the Berrybrook philosophy is often evident. Teachers are not pushing children on the swings or holding children as they attempt the monkey bars. Even in the first-year program, children are encouraged to independently wash hands and throughout the year, to take more responsibility for snack and other classroom routines. When winter comes, Berrybrook children learn to dress themselves for the outdoors, even if it takes many long minutes to gear up for a snowy day. Each day, teachers are providing opportunities for social growth and intellectual discovery, letting children puzzle through problems and find solutions. Though children may struggle or feel frustrated when things are not easy, the teachers at Berrybrook, with a patient, matter-of-fact approach, convey a genuine belief in the abilities of all children. While persisting on the swingset or carefully pouring water from a heavy pitcher, with teachers praising the process and hard work, children at Berrybrook are developing a growth mindset that will benefit them as they continue to learn new things and face new challenges.

Carol Dweck, of Stanford University, published the book, *Mindset: The New Psychology of Success*, in 2006. The book, and her subsequent research, has had far-reaching implications for teaching and parenting. Dweck explains how one's mindset directly affects one's achievement. She contrasts a growth mindset, one where an individual believes he or she, and others, can develop intelligence and new abilities through effort and using meaningful feedback, with a fixed mindset, one where an individual believes his or her, and others', intelligence and abilities are innate, or fixed. When children, and the adults who spend time with them, have a growth mindset, struggles and even failures become exciting learning opportunities instead of stressful reminders of weaknesses.

As children grow up, they will obviously face more and more challenges, and in the face of some of those challenges, it can seem easier to fall back on a fixed mindset. "I'm just not good at math" or "I can't draw" are statements commonly made by adults. Inadvertently, statements like these model to children that some types of intelligence or skills cannot be gained through purposeful, dedicated practice. Other types of statements, like "You're so smart at math" or "You're so good at reading" can also reinforce a fixed mindset. They can say to kids that being smart or good at something should just come naturally, and when tasks in those areas become more challenging, children can begin to doubt their abilities and avoid taking risks to learn new things.

In their expectations of and communication with children, the teachers at Berrybrook demonstrate and foster a growth mindset for physical, social, and intellectual growth. Children leave Berrybrook confident in themselves and their ability to learn, recognizing that people learn in different ways at different times, but all with the ability to gain new intelligence and skills.

#### BERRYBROOK OUTDOOR CLASSROOM

Welcome to the Berrybrook Nook! Most of the classes have made at least one visit to this amazing space. By all reports, teachers and students have been experiencing very engaging and positive learning activities.

Children are engaging with nature in concrete ways. This is a hands-on way to work at their own pace. We added materials to the *Construct* area this week consisting of long, thin trees and a variety of tree cookies. Many building projects sprouted as a result of these additions. Cooperation to manage and move long or heavy items has been an important theme. Balance, trial and error, and useful suggestions among children are examples of what this natural space is conjuring up for our children.

The staff plans to use the Nook in all types of weather. There is a great benefit to experience nature in all types of weather. Rain, for instance. The sound of gently falling raindrops has a calming effect on our nervous systems. Sounds in the wet forest are different from when the area is dry. Footsteps sound different. Animals sound different. There are different smells. Voices travel in altered ways. Even the wind sounds different. During rain, there are new discoveries to uncover in places that seem to be unchanging.

The cold, snow and warm breezes of spring and summer will afford many opportunities for noticing similarities and differences in our outdoor classroom. We intend to utilize this outdoor classroom in all types of weather. Please send your child to school with weather appropriate clothing. Often, when it feels warm at home, the temperature difference at Berrybrook can be much cooler. On rainy or snowy days, rain gear and snow gear will make your child much more comfortable. In addition, please remember that closed-toe shoes work best when walking in the woods.

Look for pictures in the school lobby, of some of our classes enjoying The NOOK.
