Notes from the Head of School

Happy New Year! While most people see January as the commencement of a new year, September is usually my cue. Starting this month we begin enrolling students for a new year at Berrybrook. Whether a family is continuing on from a previous year, starting fresh, or returning to us after a break, we are gearing up to enroll students for September. January is always an exciting time around here, especially when we receive an application and see names of the little ones who were born while an older sibling was a student. How quickly the times goes by from when we were looking at their tiny body in the baby bucket and then realize that it is their turn in a Berrybrook classroom!

I did not have the honor of meeting Katharine Mann, who passed away a few years before I began teaching at Berrybrook. However, I feel her presence and strive to continue her legacy. I am thankful for the foresight Mrs. Mann had....to know in the 1950s she had the drive and determination to not only recognize the importance of early childhood education, but to be a female business owner in that time period....that's just About ten years after founding our school, Mrs. Mann placed legal amazing. responsibility for Berrybrook's welfare in the hands of the Berrybrook Board of To this day, they continue to carry on Mrs. Mann's vision and they are a Directors. group of dedicated custodians of her vision. The Board was established "To ensure continuance of present policy of the school, which is to put the interests of the children first, to maintain the atmosphere of freedom of expression within reasonable limits in a home like atmosphere, to offer the children a wide variety of experiences by means of a competent and understanding staff which will help prepare the child for the rest of his life; to always keep the emotional welfare of the child as the main objective." Part of the Board's job is to keep an eye on the school's expenses while also ensuring that the students have a quality early childhood education under the guidance of skilled experienced early childhood educators. Mrs. Mann's foresight also created the Lucretia Prentiss Bailey Trust in honor of her mother, which means the school has an operating

budget that is not 100% tuition driven. Her ongoing charitable gift through this Trust allows the Board to set tuition rates 25% below the true cost of our programs. What this means is that next fall for example, the true cost of the 5 Day tuition for families is \$8,408, but because of the Trust's contribution the 5 Day tuition rate is \$6,340. The Board is responsible for, and strives to, keep tuition rate comparable to other schools while maintaining the low student-teacher ratio, competitive staff salaries, plentiful resources, and more that Berrybrook is proud of.

Mrs. Mann also set up the Helen Wheeler Scholarship Fund, which is the primary source of tuition assistance for Berrybrook families. The purpose of this fund is to provide tuition assistance to parents and/or guardians of children who have been accepted to Berrybrook, and who would not be able to attend without financial assistance. Mrs. Mann never wanted to the cost to prevent a child from attaining a quality early childhood education. This confidential process allowed ten children this year alone to attend Berrybrook, who may have not been able to experience Berrybrook.

As I mentioned last month, at Berrybrook we work every single day to help shape the students into kind, compassionate members of society. In a community with many choices for early childhood programs, I thank you for choosing Berrybrook and allowing us to be a part of your child's life, and your family.

First Year Project Notes



Welcome back! We hope all of our Berrybrook families had a wonderful holiday break. As we fly right into the New Year, we will be discussing topics like hospital and animal hospital, bears, and birds! One of our all time favorite projects we will be doing is our pine cone bird feeder.

The following is a break down of how the pine cone bird feeder fosters all aspects of our curriculum and philosophy at Berrybrook:

Language Arts will be touched upon by reading stories about all sorts of birds.

Mathematics will be practiced by categorizing birds into different shapes, sizes, and colors. If we are to be so fortunate, we'll get to quickly explore time by looking at Mrs O'Neil's bird clock!

Science is included by learning about the natural environment of birds and how they eat to survive...even in the cold northeast winters.

Social Studies is taught by encouraging students to bring their bird feeders home to feed the birds around their own habitats.

Art gets messy with this project! Students are able to sculpt a masterpiece of their own with just 3 materials. The bird feeder consists of a pine cone, shortening, and lots of bird seeds.

Second Year Project Notes



In the month of January, the second year students focus on birds. They learn about the differences and similarities among the wide variety of birds; where they live, the sounds they make, the eggs they lay, etc. We have a few projects in which we create different birds (like the penguin and the owl) using various classroom materials such as construction paper, glue, feathers, markers, water colors, scissors, etc. The children trace, cut, and assemble the birds in regard to the bird's body, head, wings, legs, feet, eyes, and beaks. They really have to think about what the particular bird they are working on looks like and then create their own. What I enjoy most about these projects is how different and unique each child's bird is! No two birds are alike, even though all the children start with the same materials. You really can see how they use their imagination and their creativity!

During this unit, the children make bird tracks, assemble bird books (which is a great writing project), and we read some great books about birds. One of my favorite books is actually about a fictitious bird named, "Gertrude McFuzz". This is a book by Dr. Seuss which has a great moral to the story regarding liking yourself for who you are, and not trying to be like someone else. The children enjoy the story with Dr. Seuss's silly names of the characters and the sing-song rhyme and rhythm of his words. We follow up this book with a water color project of the character, "Gertrude McFuzz".

Gertrude is portrayed on water color paper. First the children fill their own water container to get ready, always being mindful of measuring the water level right to the line drawn on the container. The children select the colors they wish to paint her. They carefully dip their brushes in the water, (being so careful not to spill the water) then in the water color paint, and use gentle brush strokes on the water color paper to spread the color. They learn how to change colors by washing the color off in the water, then start a new fresh color. When they have completed painting all of Gertrude's body, they add a feather, of their choice, to her tail. They have learned in the story that Gertrude is happy being herself with just one feather on her tail.

This project, as well as the other bird projects, solidify the information they have learned about birds. They enjoy this unit and enjoy learning and creating their own birds. Look for your child's work as it will be displayed in the hallways, and in our classroom. You will see, as we teachers do, the thought and creativity that your children have put in!

My life and Berrybrook became interconnected from the first time I saw that boat in the school yard. I was setting a personal goal for myself back in 2012 to run my first half marathon. While my weekend long runs began to lengthen I needed to find new roads to train on. I did a brief MapQuest and found a nice 10 mile loop that took me to what used to be a blinking light where Winter St meets 53. At almost the turnaround I looked off to my right and saw the Carolina Skiff on the playground and thought how great it must be for the kids who attend that school to play, pretend and climb all over that vessel. While looking at preschools for the first of our three children, we compared curriculums, accreditations, distance from our home and settings of the schools.
