
Notes from the Head of School

In my opinion, last month was a difficult month for parents. My boys are older - almost 12 and 8.5 - and knew guite a bit about the election and the candidates. As a family we had some lively discussions with everyone chiming in with their opinion, and the boys had a lot of questions about the topics also. Regardless of how anyone felt about a situation, we were kind in our responses and treatment of one another. As a parent it was at times hard to enforce that family quality, when the candidates who were running for President weren't so kind to each other. This tends to be the time of year where families are looking at opportunities to provide for those less fortunate and who may not be able to provide for their families as we are able to. I challenge you all to carry this sentiment throughout the whole year - not just donating food at Thanksgiving or toys at Christmas/Hanukkah. Second Year Project Notes

The Seahorse

One of my favorite projects to do with the 4 and 5 Day children is the seahorse. After reading the book Mr. Seahorse, by Eric Carle, we discuss some facts about seahorses that we learn from the book and what the children may already know from their past experiences and discussions with family. This supports language arts skills, giving the children a chance to express themselves and work on memory recall. Our discussion also includes learning in the areas of science as well as social sciences while we discuss seahorses' habitat and their characteristics.

This is one of the many projects that will take the children more than one day to complete. It is time-consuming and the children put a lot of work into creating this sea creature. The first day, students watercolor paint a paper seahorse. This step supports art and creative thinking, planning what color combination to use and how they will apply it on the body. The next day the children choose and cut painted scraps of paper to make spikes on the back of the seahorse. Mathematics is applied as the students count a minimum of five spikes. They are shown how to glue the spikes on the back side of their paper so that the colorful spikes can be seen. In this step, the children are hearing directional words such as 'behind' and 'on top', well as opposites. A cupcake wrapper, the ones often used to serve snack, is cut in half and glued to create a fin. Finally, an eye is glued on the front of the seahorse. The cutting and gluing involved in this final day strengthen children's fine motor skills which is part of health education and development. The process, as well as the product, are an example of the children's daily hard work here at Berrybrook!

The holidays are quickly approaching and we are beginning to feel that magic in the air. There is something so special about having little ones at this time of year. Not just for the fun of watching them feverishly opening gifts but the twinkle in their eye when they watch the first snowfall, or their sweet little voices caroling, or they anticipation of baking cookies on a chilly day. This time of year it is also important to remember those that may not be so fortunate to have a warm safe place to create these wonderful memories. It is challenging with children to articulate the struggles of those less fortunate at this young age, however I believe it is instrumental to instill in our children that their lives are blessed but certainly not everyone is as lucky. Colder weather is on its way...

Berrybrook will cancel school if **Duxbury Public Schools** are closed due to weather emergencies. Please watch 7NEWS (NBC) for cancellation notices. Parents may call the school to check the voice mail message if they are unsure about a snow cancellation. As the weather changes, be sure to dress children appropriately for outdoor play, including the Nook. Now is a good time to locate all hats, mittens, gloves, and warm jackets that will be necessary as we head into December. Once the snow flies, children should bring snow pants and snow boots. Children are welcome to keep slippers, sneakers, or crocs at school to make sure they are comfortable in the classroom. **Please remember to label all clothing.**



Our school family has been enjoying The Nook at Berrybrook in new ways this past month. First year classes look forward to their visits. The children become excited while getting their coats on; making plans with friends about what they will do. Sounds of running, jumping and laughter rise up with the melodies created on the Marimba and Akambira. They are making discoveries while enjoying the sounds of nature.

Second year classes have been exploring, measuring, and predicting. The main focus of the Nook is active child-based learning. Children are leading the course of discussions. One of the skills teachers are actively encouraging is being observant of details. We encourage children to label what they see, make a hypothesis about what is happening and what the outcome might be. They then have the opportunity to reproduce these ideas on paper.

We have MANY budding scientists and naturalist! The children are bringing these skills into many parts of the Berrybrook day. It is so exciting to hear a child transfer the knowledge gained outdoors to the classroom when they make connections.

We are adding materials and equipment as the school year progresses. We now have tables for artwork and building with small items. We look forward to using a wonderful new water table in the spring. Real red clay bricks add a new component to the building area where the children are using them in very creative ways. All classes will have an opportunity to plant Narcissus (daffodil) bulbs in the NOOK. We look forward to watching them bloom in the spring.

Five Day worked on a Locust Tree seedpod project one day. Creating these shakers outdoors in the lovely fall sunshine, beneath trees which have stood on the school property for years made me feel connected to the past. Native peoples, as well as cultures all over the world have used these seedpods to make music for hundreds of years. Children were relaxed, working so carefully and expressively during that activity. Perhaps they were feeling connected as well. One of the things teachers are noticing while learning in the NOOK is enhanced attention spans. This beneficial byproduct of outdoor learning seems to be helping children settle, focus and express themselves more confidently.

The children attending Lunch Bunch Program also visit the NOOK. This time before eating together has been a great time for them.

Please remember we welcome families to visit the NOOK while school is not in session, so come down and enjoy. Just please remember to bring your trash with you when you leave.

Also, please remember to dress for the weather - layers are a great way. When it feels warm in the parking lot, the NOOK often feels much colder. Rain and snow are wonderful ways to explore in nature. The teachers will be taking full advantage of these opportunities as the seasons change.
