### Notes from the Head of School

Change is hard. Merriam-Webster defines change as "the act, process, or result of changing, such as the act of becoming different or of causing someone or something to become different" or "the act of replacing one thing with another". That very definition almost brings out a sense of fear or stress....why change or replace something that seems to be working? The phrase "if it ain't broke, don't fix it" comes to mind. However, under certain circumstances things need to change, and those circumstances aren't always negative. Yes, certain events are stressful and/or unavoidable and can rock one's world. Regular change events, no matter how much one is prepared for the event, can also toss around someone's world.

As I see the 4 and 5 Day students walk with their families to their new classroom, you can feel the emotions of change. Parents are excited to see their children embark on a new adventure but feel a twinge of sadness to see them move onto their next stage; they are almost in mourning that their child will no longer have the title of a 2 or 3 Day student. It is emotional to send your child off to the next unknown, but children need to know that you have faith in them and that you have made the best decision. If they see your sadness at their growth, they might think they have done something wrong or that this change is not good for them.

At Berrybrook, we are always changing. The teaching teams change, the children in the classroom change, the families in the hallway change. Arguably, one of the biggest changes lately happened over the summer with the retirement of Patricia Keeley after sixteen years. This spring after the announcement of my new role as Head of School, many teachers thought it was their time to make a change. When the dust settled with all the switching, there was only one teaching team staying the same - and side note, that team will have their own change when Mrs. Savoy goes on maternity leave in the spring (see.....change is a good thing!).



Even with all the switching of teams, the philosophy of Berrybrook holds strong. Regardless of who holds the teacher roles in the classroom, the traditions of Berrybrook are still present and the children will not feel that "rocking of their world" often associated with change. By the time Ice Cream Day arrives, you may not believe the metamorphosis that has occurred in your student, and perhaps your whole family. On more than one occasion, I have had families tell me that Berrybrook has impacted their whole family in such a positive way. Change can be scary, but I'm excited for all the changes coming our way. Let's embrace change together!

#### **Beginners Notes**

Our Beginners year is off to a great start! The children are becoming comfortable in their new environment and are excited to explore the classroom activities. Friendships are forming with both their peers and teachers. There are lots of smiles and laughter during our mornings together.

Our Beginners program is different from that of the 3 and 4 year old programs. The focus in our classroom is more on play, growing independence, and forming friendships. While we aren't a project-based classroom, projects are a part of our daily program. While optional for this age group, most children choose to participate daily. On Thursdays, we work on a large group project. Directions and visuals are given after we read our daily story and the children are usually very excited to come to the project table and give it a try. On Friday the project is very similar but on a smaller scale and more of an individual effort. The repetition of skills is very important for this age. As with any skill, the more they practice, the more confident they become. The understanding of knowing what to do next is exciting for them.

One example of a project we worked on are the goldfish we made the first week of school. On Thursday our project table was covered in white paper and had a large fish drawn on it. The students all helped "color" our fish using small pieces of orange and yellow tape the teachers had ready for them. On Friday, they were given an individual fish and tape to repeat the project. This large project/small project process will continue throughout the year. Some of the projects they will be working on in the weeks to come are color mixing (using red and blue to make purple), gluing paper to make red, green, and yellow apples, and painting bright orange pumpkins.

Thank you for sharing your children with us. We are excited to help them learn and explore.

## First Year Project Notes

One of the first traditional projects for the first year students at Berrybrook is rock painting. We read the book <u>Rock Finds a Friend</u>, in which a lonely rock develops a friendship with a young boy. In the story "rock" guides the boy to become more socially aware and kind to others. Eventually the two form a great friendship. This story parallels



the type of relationship development we see in the first few weeks of school with our first year students. "Rock" had never had a friend. The boy did not understand "how to be a friend". Together they "figure it out"! Social and emotional growth is a key element to our first year program.

To follow through with the story, children can choose a rock to paint. For our first year students, project is a choice. So if your child did not paint a rock, don't be disappointed. They chose not to paint. We will always ask them if they want to make a project.

In order to paint their rock, children must complete several steps:

- 1) They must choose a rock. This can be more difficult than you might think.
- 2) Children are then asked to write their name or make a mark on the paper plate their rock was on.
- 3) Next they choose a seat at the table and begin painting.
- The painting process is unique to each child. Some children use a lot of paint. Some use very little paint. Some use all colors available, others prefer one color.
- 5) Once they are finished painting, children carry their own rock on the paper plate to the drying area. This is actually quite challenging and involves a lot of coordination. Some rocks end up rolling around on the floor! That is a "teachable moment" and the teachers help the child problem solve how to remedy the situation.
- 6) Lastly, children wash their hands to remove excess paint.

In this one activity children have been challenged in several key development areas: social and emotional development, language development, social studies, art and motor development. This all happened in one activity! In the coming weeks we have so many more exciting and enriching activities in store for your children. But please remember playing is the greatest form of learning! So if you don't see a project come home, maybe it is because your child was busy building a friendship.

## Second Year Project Notes

The Cutting Edge

The 4 and 5 Day classes are different in many ways from the 2 and 3 Day classes, and indeed they should be. The children are an entire year older, developmental skills are stronger and expectations in the classroom match their increased social and emotional levels.

This year is a very preparatory year for kindergarten. There are more experiences to practice social skills such as conflict resolution and problem solving, and there is daily practice with writing and cutting skills as well. Children will be coming to the project table daily, just like they would visit a table area in kindergarten. They will be writing their name daily (which may even be just a mark or one letter to start) as well as gluing, painting, tracing and cutting. The skill of cutting increases strength and coordination in the fingers and hand, and will ultimately help with the skill of writing.

One of our first cutting projects sounds very simple but contains many valuable lessons in cutting and strengthening fine motor skills. It also takes a lot of thinking and concentration. The children are shown an apple and we talk about its shape. They are then given a square piece of paper and asked how they can turn the square into the shape of an apple. "Cut it!" they say. When given the scissors, the children soon try out snipping the corners of the square and realize the square is changing shape. It is becoming more round. They then continue to cut a bit more to create, what they feel, is the shape of an apple. You see, an apple is not perfectly round. No two apples are exactly the same. When each child finishes and adds a piece of tape for the stem and hangs it on a real, live tree in the classroom ...voila! They have just helped create an apple tree by thinking, planning, cutting, cutting some more, and deciding when it becomes their finished apple! This first cutting experience becomes the foundation for all cutting with projects to follow throughout the year to create and change the shape of their paper from just "paper" to a "pumpkin", a "face", a "ball"....you get the picture!

We're off to a great start in the 4 and 5 Day classes. Your children are working hard every day and are very proud of their projects. Children love to hear a heartfelt "Congratulations!" followed by things you notice about their work when they bring it home. Thank you for your help in fostering their creativity in their work.
