This month, Berrybrook School celebrates a very important anniversary. On January 2, 1978 Mrs. O'Neil began teaching at Berrybrook. FORTY years ago!! It's hard to imagine anyone in this day and age working in the same environment for forty years, but even more astounding to recognize that this time has been spent in the demanding field of early childhood education. Mrs. O'Neil has been an educator at Berrybrook so long, she has now taught many children of her former students. I told her that her next accomplishment will be having a student who is a grandchild of a former student!

Often when Mrs. Piccuito or I are touring a prospective alum family around the school, they will shyly mention they have memories of Mrs. O'Neil being their teacher and then they are shocked to learn that she is still teaching! Usually, the next step is a remark that there is no way she will remember them and then we are all floored when she will recognize them. She may not recall their name as they walk through the classroom on that tour, but she will usually come to the office later with a tidbit or story of the former student. It's amazing to me each and every time that happens.

Please join me in congratulating Mrs. O'Neil on this amazing accomplishment, and on her life dedication to supporting children and families. She has easily educated hundreds of children in her tenure at Berrybrook, but it goes without saying that her influence goes way beyond the classroom. Mrs. O'Neil has always put Berrybrook as one of her top priorities, and I am personally thankful to reap the benefits of her knowledge and experiences. She has taught me a thing or two along the way, and continues to do so. Thank you, Mrs. O'Neil.

Beginners Notes

Come Together To The Circle



Perhaps it begins with a song sung by a teacher, a song on CD, a favorite tune on one of the Berrybrook record albums, or a song recently downloaded on the class ipod. Whatever the source, music symbolizes Circle Time to Beginners. Just as a teacher singing the Hello Song at Story Time tells children to come on over to share a story, music at Circle Time announces to children, "It's time to sing, dance, move our bodies, laugh and be joyful, learn something new, or learn something by remembering and repeating class favorites.

Circle Time for the Beginners Class can involve many different moods and feelings. It develops naturally in response to the children's energy and may relate to what they are seeing and experiencing around them. There is a lot going on around Beginners. From the moment they wake up, life is about their favorite blanket or stuffed animal, how they get dressed and brush their teeth, what's for breakfast, how cold or warm it is outside. what they see on the car ride to school. How they feel about saying goodbye to their mom, dad, grandparent or caregiver and thinking about when they'll see them after we sing the Goodbye Song. What emotions they are feeling that day, whether they feel like building, painting, or exploring with water, and....perhaps most importantly...what they'll eat for snack! With all of this whirling around the Beginners, songs, movement and fun at Circle Time relate to it all. Maybe we play the "Elevator Song" to practice, again, how to balance as our body rises slowly with each elevator floor sung aloud. Then comes the song "Miss Lucy Had A Turtle" because our hearts delight in laughing together when we make the funny sound with our tongue representing how the turtle sounds after "eating up all the soap". Songs like "She'll Be Coming 'Round The Mountain" test our listening and sequencing skills as we need to remember each part in order and practice the appropriate movement along with the lyrics!

Added activities at Circle Time, such as anticipating what's in the Magic Pouch, allows for a quiet experience and emphasizes strong focus. The process gradually evolves from everyone getting and holding their own item from the Magic Pouch to each having a turn holding, then passing to each other, only one item. This demonstrates great strides in listening, patience and responsibility. To conclude Circle Time each day, children relax into the reassurance of the Goodbye Song, happily and gently singing along with each of their classmates, teachers and goldfish, knowing their caregiver will soon come through the door and all will be well in their world.

For all of the above to occur one may ask, "How much time is allotted for Circle Time for Beginners?" The range of all these glorious experiences of a Beginner Circle Time in September and October began at a developmentally appropriate duration of 5 minutes, grew to 7 – 10 minutes through late November and most recently became extended to 10 – 12 minutes. As the Beginners return from the Holiday Break and become reacquainted with the daily routine they will be ready for Circle Time to be a little bit longer and to include more movement activities...even added movement activities as a class in the Multipurpose Room! We look forward to it! Happy New Year!

First Year Notes

Sensory in the classroom

First year activities include many options for sensory play each and every day.

Look in each first-year classroom, and you will find many options for sensory play throughout the room. Sand play, water play, playdough, and finger painting with not only paint, but also mud, shaving cream, and snow are some of the things children can explore with. The water table also lends itself to many interesting sensory interactions.

Just recently, bins of glitter were involved as part of a project. The children were directed to add some glitter to their masterpiece before they were put aside to dry. As I observed the glitter fall through their hands, I noticed some children giggle with delight, others looking pensive, and still others becoming agitated. Each child had an individual reaction to this new sensation.

So why is this important for children to experience? There are many benefits for young children. This type of play enhances children's learning by stimulating their senses. What a wonderful way to explore our world! Sensory play supports language development, cognitive growth, fine and gross motor skills, problem solving skills and social interaction.

Because there is no right or wrong way to play, sensory activities provide opportunities for children to learn make their own discoveries. This allows them to make and create their own conclusions about their play.

Sensory play includes any activity that stimulates your child's senses: touch, smell, taste, movement, balance, sight and hearing. Sensory activities facilitate exploration and naturally encourage children to use scientific processes while they play, create, investigate and explore.

And it's fun!

Second Year Notes

January is for the birds

In the month of January, the second year students learn all about birds. They usually have lengthy conversations about the differences and similarities among bird types, where they live, the sounds they make, the eggs they lay, etc. We have a few projects where we create different birds using various classroom materials such as, construction paper, glue, markers, water colors, scissors, and of course, feathers!!!. The children have to trace, cut, and assemble the birds in regard to the bird's body, head, wings, legs, feet, eyes, and beaks. They really have to take time to think about what the particular bird they are working on looks like and then create their own. What I enjoy most about these projects is how different and unique each child's bird is! No two birds are alike! You really can see how they use their imagination and their creativity.

Some of the bird projects the children make include a penguin (the penguin's body is actually traced from your child's shoe!) and an owl. The students also create bird tracks using pipe cleaners and wood blocks, learn some fun bird songs, and we read some great books about birds. One of my favorite books is actually about a fictitious bird named "Gertrude McFuzz". This is a book by Dr. Seuss which has a great moral to the story regarding liking yourself for who you are, and not trying to be like someone else. Gertrude has one feather on her tail, and her friend has more. She learned that having more feathers on her tail did not make her a better bird and she was perfect with her tail the way it is. The children enjoy the story with Dr. Seuss's silly names of the characters and the sing-song rhyme and rhythm of his words. We follow up this book with a water color project of the character, "Gertrude McFuzz".

Gertrude is portrayed on water color paper. The children select the colors they wish to paint her. They carefully dip their brushes in the water, then in the water color paint, and then use gentle brush strokes on the water color paper to spread the color. They learn how to change colors by washing the color off in the water, then start a new fresh color. When they have completed painting all of Gertrude's body, they add one feather to her tail in a color they choose.

This project, as well as the other bird projects, solidify the information they have learned about birds. They enjoy this unit and enjoy learning and creating their own birds. Look for your child's work as it will be displayed in the hallways, and in our classroom. You will see, as we teachers do, the thought and creativity that your children have put in!
