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Notes from the Head of School

Five hundred pounds of candy . . . actually more than 500 hundred pounds! When Mrs. Buchanan (Grace's mom from 3 Day) first approached us about collecting candy for the troops through an organization called Soldier's Angels we all thought maybe we'd collect a couple of sand pails full of treats. The first two days of collections filled a large tote, which held roughly twenty gallons. At that point, Mrs. Piccuito and I knew that we would be looking at large amounts of candy for the next 10 days! The Berrybrook families were very generous and then the phone and door bell starting ringing, with others who had heard that we were collecting candy or they had seen our name listed on the Soldier's Angels website. Everyone who dropped off candy was so gracious and thanking US for taking in the donations for the troops. Mrs. Piccuito and I could barely maneuver through the office, and at one point she had a hard time getting to her desk to sit down ~ it was comical! After the Berrybrook collections were closed, I heard from my sons' school who wanted to pass along their candy to us. The donations came from far and wide, and was truly amazingly overwhelming in such a positive way!

One might think, too, that all that candy visible to the students when they passed by for arrival and dismissal would have them clamoring for candy or not wanting to give up their personal stash but it was quite the opposite. Students were dropping their loot into the totes, letting us know that they were sharing with others. One student asked about the candy and we explained that it was for the soldiers; later that morning when I went into his classroom to visit he asked me, "Mrs. Watts, are you a soldier?" When I replied that I was not a solider, he responded "Oh, so you are a helper to the soldiers, collecting all the candy for them?"

This month, the Berrybrook Parents Association kicks off their charitable giving project. In years past, we have had a tree holding tags of children and families' This year however, we have joined up with Horizons for specific wishes. Homeless Children, and the items donated by the families will go directly to over 90 shelters statewide that Horizons for Homeless Children partner with. The fastest growing homeless population in Massachusetts is a single mother with two preschool aged children, and there are twenty shelters right in the Southeast Horizons for Homeless programs rely solely on donations for region alone. staffing and toys, and the spaces throughout the state provide over 1,000 hours of play each week to children. While it may be different this year for a Berrybrook family to either choose a tag from the tree or shop via the Amazon wish list without knowing the donations will go to a specific child or family, please know that each and every donated item is much needed and very much appreciated by the folks at Horizons for Homeless Children. Sadly, as of a few weeks ago, Berrybrook was the only offer of help for sponsorship during this holiday season.

I know this giving project will be a success because that is Berrybrook. Just like the Berrybrook student knew that I was a helper to the soldiers, I know that Berrybrook families are natural helpers. I see it in the classrooms when the students share their most favorite object in housekeeping with a classmate, I see it when families hold open the door for the baby stroller coming through behind them, and I see it through the quarter-ton of candy sent to the soldiers. It's the little things, but those are the things that help - benefiting both the giver and the receiver.

Second Year Notes

Watercolor Candle



As we transition to December, our focus turns to winter and end of the year holidays. The children stay very busy in the cozy, warm classroom as the temperatures start to drop outside. The air is often filled with the aroma of potato latkes and sugar cookies while holiday music is being sung in the classrooms. It is truly a magical time of year around here.

One traditional project done in December is the watercolor candle. As with many of the traditions at Berrybrook, they evolve and become a little more involved in the second year program progressing from a more simple first year project. Each child is given a cut out shape of a candle and a separate flame. Students are given a variety of watercolor paints to choose from to decorate their paper candles. They are encouraged to paint carefully to cover the entire white shape with special watercolor brushes. Children use watercolors again to paint the flame separately and often add some glitter detail. After the candle has dried and the flame is attached, it is time to decorate the tree.

All of the classes participate in this project and hang their colorful candles up on a wood frame tree that stands at the entrance of the school. This encourages children to be able to show their work to others; friends and family members have an opportunity to see what they have been working on. Having all of the candles together on one tree symbolizes the sense of community we share at Berrybrook. The students are proud of their own work and excited to see what others have created.

From The Board of Directors

As we approach the thick of the busy holiday season, if you're like our family, you are already busy planning holiday travel, menus, and gift lists. With all there is to do, I find that we always neglect to plan fun, kid-centric activities for New Year's Eve. Below are some easy ideas to make NYE with kids a little more fun.

- Paper plate shakers make great New Year's Eve noisemakers! Simply glue two small paper plates together around the edges, fill with rice or dried beans, and insert a craft stick while you're gluing everything together. When the glue is dry, decorate the noisemakers with stickers, rhinestones, sequins, confetti, etc.
- Make resolutions! Sit down and discuss what goals and resolutions you can make, individually and as a family, for the new year. Once you're finished, hang them up on the fridge to keep everyone motivated.
- Make homemade holiday crackers, using empty toilet paper rolls. Simply fill the rolls with candy/treats/glitter, wrap tightly in tissue paper, and then wrap again with wrapping paper, cinching the each end with ribbon to create handles.
- Create a signature mocktail and have each family member make a toast to the new year. One suggestion: 1.5C apple juice, 1/4C frozen white grape juice concentrate, 2.25C club soda or seltzer; garnish with fresh fruit.
- Craft a ball-shaped piñata that resembles the ball in Times Square, kids can help to decorate and then break it open at midnight (or bedtime). Alternatively, suspend a bunch of balloons above your party and release them at midnight.
- For those who can't make it to midnight (kids and adults!), Netflix and YouTube both have a few kid-friendly countdowns that can be done at any time for a mock celebration.
- Have kids spend time scrapbooking their memories from the previous year, or making time capsules that will be sealed until the children turn 18 (or at least until the next New Year's Eve).

It is our policy to cancel classes whenever Duxbury Public Schools are closed due to weather emergencies. Families should watch Channel 7, WHDH for a school cancellation at Berrybrook. Every attempt at notification will be made through email messages, text messages, phone calls via OneCallNow and/or social media. In the event Duxbury Public Schools require a one hour delay, Berrybrook will have the usual 9am arrival time. In the event Duxbury Public Schools require a two hour delay, the AM session, as well as Lunch Bunch, will be cancelled. Beyond a formal cancellation, we urge parents to use their best judgment about driving young children to school in inclement weather.

As the weather changes, be sure to dress children appropriately for outdoor play, including the Nook. Now is a good time to locate all hats, mittens, gloves, and warm jackets that will be necessary as we head into December. Once the snow flies, children should bring snow pants and snow boots. Children are welcome to keep slippers, sneakers, or crocs at school to make sure they are comfortable in the classroom. **Please remember to label all clothing**.
