Notes from the Head of School

"I don't want to go to school!" "There's nothing fun at school". "No one plays with me." "I don't like school" "I want to stay home with you."

Chances are you have heard one or all of these claims from your child about preschool. And chances are, you felt some conflicting feelings about these statements. Is your child too young for "school"? Are you forcing something on them that will be required for 13 years of elementary, middle, and high school, thus setting them up for hating a school environment? Should you stick with your decision to send them to preschool, knowing in the long run it will be fine? All of us at Berrybrook shout <u>YES!</u> to the last question.

You know that transitions for young children can be hard. If it's hard enough to coax your little one into the car to go grocery shopping or to get into the tubby, isn't it reasonable to expect that one of the largest transitions of their short existence will of course ripple their lives and, by extension, your life?

What I have found helpful is to explain to children that it is their "job" to go to school. If you have older children, you can also let them know that their sibling's job is to go to 2nd grade and learn x, y, z or whatever your situation may be. If the sibling is a Berrybrook alum, you can let your preschooler know that their brother or sister had the same job at their age. In your Open House folder, there was a handout about Positive Goodbyes that Berrybrook teachers put together many years ago, after many thousands

of goodbyes witnessed in the classroom. Their advice - which I agree with a bazillion percent and added my own two cents to - is:

Your child will sense what you are feeling. Your body language, tone of voice, and choice of words are important. Any ambivalence on your part will be obvious. If you appear sad about leaving, your child might think, "Should I be happy at school if my mom/dad looks so sad?" It's almost as if you need to put your 'Game Face' on during drop-off. If you're happy, your child will be happy!

Always say good bye to your child. Leaving without notice may let a child think you've "disappeared" and they may not be sure you will come back. After saying goodbye, remind your child when you will see them again - "I'll be back to pick you up when the bell rings.", "I will see you at dinner.", etc. It may seem easier in the moment to sneak out, but that may only translate into a more amped up emotional reaction at the next drop-off.

A reasonably short, sincere goodbye is usually best. Saying goodbye multiple times or lingering and asking your child if it is "OK" for you to leave, may make separation more difficult and send mixed messages to your child. It's hard enough for them to say goodbye to you once - numerous times saying goodbye may be heart-wrenching for all, and also may restart everyone at Square One.

Feel free to ask a teacher to help with separation. Your child may be comforted by taking a teacher's hand as you leave. Berrybrook teachers deal with separation every year and have experience and suggestions. This may be your first time having separation issues with your preschooler, but teachers have done this a thousand times. It does not discount the feelings you and your children are experiencing, but remember that Berrybrook teachers are skilled and have quite the bag of many tricks to help.

If your child is upset when you leave, comfort yourself by contacting the school to check in. Most children who are upset at separation are happily playing within a short time. Feel free to call or email Mrs. Watts for an update. It's never a bother to check in with us. We would rather answer dozens of calls or emails reporting happy updates, than have you worrying or thinking the worst for the 2-3 hours you are away from your child. Also, we completely understand it seems to go against every parental instinct - if your child is crying and screaming, your job is to comfort and protect them right? Why would you leave them in the throes of distress? Because think of how proud of themselves they will be when they are able to self-regulate and have an amazing time at school! And, as parents our job is to teach our children the coping skills they need and that will be beneficial throughout their lives ~ what better place to put this into practice than at Berrybrook?

Berrybrook is an understanding and supportive community. We all work together. If your child is crying when you leave - other parents will understand, teachers will calm and comfort, and classmates will be compassionate. Separation can be difficult for children and parents. Truly missing your child is understandable and normal. Working through separation and

encouraging your child to become independent and self-confident is an important parenting goal. Also remember that like each child, each teacher has a different personality and approach to separation (or really, any interaction). It may seem as though a teacher may be ignoring a child who is upset, but it could be that the teachers, even within the first days of school, know the most effective approach with each child. It could be that they know the child will not "hear" anything for the first minutes right after saying goodbye to mom or dad. They could know that the child likes to observe for a few minutes before anyone talking to them (kinda like non-morning people who need a cup of coffee before engaging!) Some children need to get a burst of something out before they can even try to function at school. And there are also some children, when offered a hug or other similar comforting gesture, are set off even more.

Please also know, that if any of the Berrybrook teachers ever felt that a child's reactions during separation were out of the realm of normal or worrisome, they would be contacting you.

We have an alum family whose oldest child is in kindergarten. During her first year at Berrybrook, she cried every day at drop-off until she returned from the holiday break and it was like a whole different child. Her brother is now at Berrybrook, and while the first couple of days of school were a breeze for his drop-offs, early season colds among the whole family changed their routines quite a bit and once healthy to return, he had a very hard time with coming to school. Mom and Dad were rockstars each morning, telling him that he would be going to school and having a fun time and that they would see him after school. Mom would check in with me after a quick goodbye, and I was happy to report to her that within 4½ minutes of drop-off he was happily playing with the toys and classmates. As the days went on, the amount of time until he settled decreased. This is Mom's response to one of my emails, which I believe is Berrybrook 101.

It is so hard but I think <big sister> showed us that if we stick to it, the results will be amazing. All the rest of the week he talks about loving school and playing with his friends. It's just those 10 minutes right before where he gets emotional. I'm positive he'll get in the swing of things soon, and it makes me so happy to know that once I leave he's okay.

I think back to how far big sister came from her tough drop-offs, and then pretty much becoming the Jr. Mayor of Berrybrook once she settled in and I know like her, everyone will be just fine.

Beginners Notes Just the Beginning



As we move into the month of November all of our Beginners are starting to settle in. We see friendships developing and the trust of the children growing more and more. We are focusing now on getting to know each child and their unique beautiful personalities. For example, what is their favorite activity? What is their favorite area of the classroom? What is their favorite thing to do in the courtyard? And yes, even what their favorite snack may be. Learning this will help us create a classroom that will appeal to each child so they will be happy and content here at Berrybrook.

The Beginners projects are based on a group perspective "our" and an individual perspective" my". Even though this class is not project based, the children always are eager to see what the project is and they cannot wait to get started. Thursdays will be the group (our) project: Our Apple, Our House, Our Tree. Whereas Friday will be the individual (my) project: My Apple, My House, and My Tree. This repetition between the two days is important to the children; the more they practice the same skill the more confident they will become. This also gives the children a sense of their own importance and will let them feel included as part of a group. They will learn how to wait their turn at the project table and show respect to their peers.

Going into the month of November, we will be talking about families. The people who live in "our" homes, what "my" home might look like to me, and what "our" favorite things are that we like to eat. We will learn new songs, new stories, and create new creations.

We are looking forward to meeting with all the families for teacher conferences. We will have sign up sheets in the classroom and will be talking with about a good meeting time. Should you have any questions or concerns please feel free to speak to one of your child's teachers.

We are very thankful to all of you for sharing your children with us. We are looking forward to a very fun and exciting holiday season here at Berrybrook!!

First Year Notes Traditions



November is a month filled with traditions. At Berrybrook many of those traditions involve cooking and baking with traditional methods. We will begin the month with a favorite Berrybrook tradition...Jelly!

Making jelly is a process and the children are involved in all the stages. First, we must pick the grapes. A station will be set up in the classroom for children to come over during our morning time to pick some grapes and place them into the pot. This is a wonderful opportunity to use fine motor skills with their pincer grasp. At circle time the teachers will explain that we must cook the grapes in order to make them soft.

The next day, when the grapes have been cooked and cooled, the children will take turns crushing them in an old fashioned cone strainer with a wooden pestle. They will see the juice drain into the pan. The children are using muscles to crush the grapes and learning new and interesting methods of making food. They are seeing and smelling the grapes, as well as learning new vocabulary that goes along with the process.

The next step involves cooking the jelly. For this step we enlist the help of an adult. Although the children cannot cook the jelly, classes typically take a field trip to the kitchen hallway to smell the jelly and maybe see the pot simmering on the stove. At circle time we will discuss all the steps we have taken to make the jelly. We may sing a song about peanut butter and jelly. At dismissal, each child will receive their own jar of jelly to share with their family!

As Thanksgiving approaches, each class will help prepare their own feast. Another Berrybrook tradition involves making our own butter. This is always a favorite among the children. We talk about where butter comes from and discuss how we could make it. The children watch as a teacher pours heavy cream into a jar, seals it shut, and then begins to shake. Each child can take a turn to "shake the cream". As they shake, we sing...

Shake, Shake Shake the cream Watch it jump and flutter Shake, shake Shake the cream Turn it into butter!

The children enjoy their butter with their classroom feast!

We wish all of our Berrybrook families a Happy Thanksgiving. May you enjoy this special time with family and friends.

Second Year Notes

Changing of the seasons



The second year children were very busy throughout October learning about the fall season, apples, pumpkins, and fire safety. As they created decorations for their Halloween scenes, the teachers took the opportunity to extend their learning. For example, the children made spiders and marble - painted spider webs which started conversations about real spiders. "Did you know spiders have eight legs and that not all webs are built the same?" After creating Berrybrook bats the children learned that bats fly at night, hang upside down, and eat lots of mosquitoes. The teachers are always extending learning whenever possible in a variety of ways based on the children's interests.

Since Halloween can be scary for some children, the classes had many discussions about real and pretend. Children were given an opportunity at circle time to discuss the things that scare them. We also read *The Little Old Lady Who Wasn't Afraid Of Anything*, by Linda Williams. The book is a Berrybrook favorite that reinforces real and pretend in a fun way. A follow-up activity for the children was creating puppets and acting out this story about a scarecrow trying to scare the little old lady. October ended with a delicious Halloween celebration. The children made individual delicious pizzas for snack that they enjoyed before heading home for trick-or-treating.

Look for our classroom jack-o'-lanterns that have been placed outdoors. The children have learned about the life cycle of a pumpkin. We read *Mousekin's Golden House*, by Edna Miller. It is a story of the seasons changing from autumn to winter and a mouse finding a home in a jack o'-lantern. After reading the story, and talking about how the pumpkin starts to decompose, the children found a special spot outside to put their class jack-o'-lantern in hopes that Mousekin will find it.

November will be another busy month. We will make our traditional trip to Plimoth Plantation. Classroom activities will help us learn about the people and history of the plantation. Throughout the month we will also be talking about family traditions and being thankful. We will be preparing for our "Feast" including another tradition at Berrybrook – freshly made butter. The children will chant these words as they shake the cream into butter.

Shake, Shake Shake the cream Watch it jump and flutter Shake, shake Shake the cream Turn it into butter!
