#### Notes from the Head of School

In a world of over seven billion people, it always surprises me how small the world can seem. More specifically, it surprises me how often my circles overlap in a world full of so many people. We all have them - our 'friend' circle, our 'work' circle, our 'family' circle, and more. A couple of years ago I was at the services for my brother-in-law's father, and I spotted a Berrybrook family across the room. As we approached each other we both blurted out, "What are YOU doing here?" at the same time. As I was saying, "Mike's my brother-in-law, married to Keith's younger sister", the Berrybrook mom told me that she and her sisters had grown up next-door to Mike's family and their families were super close and had vacationed together for years. Two of my circles were now closer, and overlapping a bit.

My vacation last month was amazing, but also bittersweet. The reason for the cruise - which had been in the plans for almost a year - was to spread the ashes of a dear friend, who passed away from breast cancer last October. The circle of those impacted by cancer certainly touches many, many people unfortunately. We met Nancy and John through my father-in-law, Bob, many years ago and we would see them at family parties and holidays, and they became our friends, and not solely friends of my in-laws, which has been true for many of their friends - I now count them in my own circle of friends.

When Nancy's second battle with cancer didn't have the prognosis we had all hoped for, she asked John to spread her ashes near the Piton Mountains in St. Lucia, where they had honeymooned in 2001 (side story: they were stuck there for 6 days due to the aftermath of 9/11). John told us about the cruise and without a second thought . . . well, first we had to make sure childcare and dog care was secured . . . we were booked on the cruise. We were made of thirteen people celebrating Nancy's life - my in-laws, friends, and Nancy's relatives. Some we had known for over twenty years, some we had met in 2011 when we helped with fundraising for the doctor who helped Nancy become cancer free the first time.

We left on a Saturday and it was a blend of tears, laughter, good food and drinks, and sunshine. On the fourth day a little light bulb went off and I realized that one of the women, who for years we had shortened her last name to a nickname, had the same last name as a current Berrybrook student . . . a name that is not at all common. I've known this woman for ages, and have known the Berrybrook family for nearly a year. When we all met for dinner that night, I asked her "Is your daughter-in-law so-and-so?" to which she replied yes and I then told her that her grandson was at Berrybrook! We laughed and joked about what a small world it is, but in reality it's another example of overlapping circles. And a reminder that you never quite know your audience, or who-may-know-who. I find that Duxbury, and by extension, Berrybrook also has tight circles. I'm always amazed to learn who went to high school together and now have their children in the same Berrybrook class. I find too, that my circles can be tighter as things change, or that my hometown circles from years ago can seem so far away, but yet that distance falls away when we see each other even if it has been twenty years.

Children are the same, and you may see your child's circles ebb and flow during the years. I've also learned, that my children's circle of friends don't have to match my own. Yes, I have gained some fabulous friends from meeting them through my kids' activities, but I know I don't have to force a circle just because my children have a circle - that's just a great benefit if and when it does naturally occur.

As for circles, I am so very thankful I was a part of seeing Nancy's circle of life with her return to the Piton mountains of St. Lucia. It was a simple ceremony where John spoke loving words saying goodbye to his wife, and we all watched as Nancy's ashes and the pink rose petals we tossed into the sea were slowly swept away. A few shots of Nancy's favorite spirit were enjoyed by many, and as Nancy was quite the jokester it was only apropos that what was probably someone whose permanent address was the beach approached our chartered boat trying to sell us very up-charged coconut chunks and bumming some money,

all while we were in the water saying our goodbyes. One could only think Nancy was watching over us trying to have "a moment" while this guy was interrupting our somber ceremony and she was having her own chuckle from up-above.

As cliché as it sounds, life is short and life can be unfair. It took a trip saying goodbye to a friend who passed way too early to recognize that it is important to get away and enjoy all I have. Coordinating work, the kids, the pooch, and more was so overwhelming to prepare for this trip. My village kicked in and many pitched in to help - the kids missed us but also enjoyed their time with friends and extended family; Berrybrook was still standing upon my return. While I feel guilty that we had such a good time on a trip that was planned for such sad reasons, I'm so glad to have been able to spend that time with that certain circle, and I probably would never had put the pieces together that my Berrybrook circle overlapped my friend circle had I not had light dawn on Marblehead that night at dinner.

During the upcoming holidays, I hope you and your numerous circles take time to slow down and enjoy this time. "Time flies" is another cliché that rings especially true this time of year and it seems to go by quicker and quicker, especially as I get older. I can't believe that next month is the start of the year 2020 - not too long ago, to reference the year 2020 was along the lines of science fiction!!



# The Berrybrook School Board of Directors is pleased to announce an exciting change for the 2020-2021 school year!

Berrybrook students will start school the Tuesday after Labor Day and finish school two weeks after Memorial Day, adding two weeks to the Berrybrook school calendar. The Board, in consultation with Mrs. Watts, Mrs. Piccuito, and the teachers, approved this change to better align the Berrybrook calendar with other schools in the area and to help children and families with the back-to-school and summer transition times. Berrybrook will still follow the traditions of Visiting Day and home visits - now a week earlier!

Berrybrook is able to provide this extra programming without raising tuition beyond the standard increase that is done each year. More details about tuition and the calendar will be mailed to families after the holidays. The Board is very excited that starting next year, Berrybrook students will experience two more weeks of all that Berrybrook has to offer - exploring nature, creating unique projects, building friendships, and having fun!
