"Alden, are you SO excited to remember what the inside of the supermarket looks like? I can't wait!"

What a wild year this has been! As parents, my husband and I have tried to normalize this past year and a half as much as possible for our children. We've tried to keep things exciting, albeit different. But occasionally, I do still have these waves of sadness and disappointment for all the things my children have missed out on this year: spending time with my 96 year old Nana; family vacations; taking the red line up to visit Daddy in the city; large holiday gatherings; and even those mundane trips to the supermarket.

A few weeks ago I found our growing collection of Berrybrook memory books spread on the floor of our living room as I do from time to time. I always enjoy flipping through them myself before I return them to the bookshelf. On this particular day, one of the books was open to Betty Carroll's poem about Berrybrook. While I frequently see the first few lines of the poem on the school's website, it was the first time in a *long time* that I read the poem in its entirety and some of the later lines struck me.
