You may have heard about the Wheeler Scholarship Fund a few times during your time at Berrybrook. If you had a tour, we mention to all families that we have a Scholarship Fund. Often, the first comment is "Oh, I don't think we'd qualify". So what exactly IS the scholarship fund?

What is it?

The Helen Wheeler Scholarship Fund is the primary source of tuition assistance to Berrybrook families. All money raised through the Annual Appeal is earmarked for the Wheeler Fund. The primary purpose of this fund is to provide tuition assistance to parents and/or guardians of children who have been accepted to Berrybrook, and who would not be able to attend without financial assistance.

Who qualifies?

The Wheeler Scholarship Fund was created by Mrs. Katharine Mann, our school's founder. She created the fund so that finances never prevented a child from attending Berrybrook. All assistance is based on demonstrated financial need, the number of families applying for assistance that year, and the amount of funding available.

Does it need to be paid back?

The assistance is a scholarship, not a loan. Many recipients will make donations to the Fund years later when their financial picture is a bit stronger as a way to pay it forward to other families.

Will the teachers or anyone else know who receives help?

The process is a confidential one. Families complete an online application, and are required to submit supporting documentation such as W2s and prior tax year reports. The Board of Directors receives a report of how much aid has been awarded and the number of children benefiting from the Fund. No names are attached to these reports.

Who is Helen Wheeler?

Helen M. Wheeler was the first director of Berrybrook, when Berrybrook first opened its doors in September 1954. Mrs. Mann and Miss Wheeler were both graduates of what was was known as the Nursery Training School of Boston, which is now the Eliot-Pearson School, a Tufts University affiliate.

How is it funded?

All money raised from the Annual Appeal or similar fundraisers (minus fees much as PayPal processing fees) goes to scholarships.

How can I receive more information?

I would be happy to speak with anyone who is interested in applying for the Wheeler Scholarship Fund!

How can I make a donation?

Berrybrook is a non-profit organization, which means any donation made is tax deductible. Donations can be made through cash, checks (made out to Berrybrook School Annual Appeal), or through our PayPal link on our website which can be found at <u>http://www.berrybrookschool.org/donate</u> Also, we are kicking off a new Annual Appeal in the New Year; stay tuned for details!

Colder weather is on its way...

It is our policy to cancel classes whenever Duxbury Public Schools are closed due to weather emergencies. Families should watch Channel 7, WHDH for a school cancellation at Berrybrook. Every attempt at notification will be made through email messages, text messages, phone calls via OneCallNow and/or social media.

In the event Duxbury Public Schools require a one hour delay, Berrybrook will have the usual 9am arrival time.

***<u>In the event Duxbury Public Schools require a two hour delay, the AM session</u> will be cancelled. ***

Beyond a formal cancellation, we urge parents to use their best judgment about driving young children to school in inclement weather.

As the weather changes, be sure to dress children appropriately for outdoor play, including the Nook. Now is a good time to locate all hats, mittens, gloves, and warm jackets that will be necessary as we head into December. Once the snow flies, children should bring snow pants and snow boots. Children are welcome to keep slippers, sneakers, or crocs at school to make sure they are comfortable in the classroom.

Please remember to label all clothing with your child's name.

Teacher's Notes

As I was pondering what to write for this month's article, I thought about the fact that I am in a unique position here at Berrybrook. This school year, I am teaching the 2 Day class as well as working in the office. Although I have been working at Berrybrook for 20 years, and have taught pretty much all the classes at one point or another, this year I realized something after being out of the classroom for many years. The importance of all the little details that go into making the classroom ready for the children each and every day.

One way that the little details are weaved into the classroom is achieved through teachers being flexible with classroom planning. Teachers plan a calendar for each month ahead of time with the knowledge that often the topics might shift depending on class discussions and interests. Circle time, in my experience, lends itself to many conversations that might change the course of the week or even longer. Speaking for myself, when a topic sparks a lot of interesting observations and questions, it can lead to many domino effects within the classroom. After the class is dismissed for the day, we will brainstorm and scour the library and our big storage space in the basement for any materials that might facilitate more learning and discussions pertaining the topic. The basement, having an enormous collection of things that have accumulated since the 1950's, can be a treasure trove for teachers looking for materials. We teachers have a limited amount of time to devout to searching, but always seem to find some interesting items when digging down there.

The precious hour that teachers have before classes start at 9:00 and 1:00 are very busy; the hallways and classes are filled with the hustle and bustle of getting the rooms set for the children to walk in ready to start their day. The teachers are actively finding ways to promote the latest topics of discussion into tangible learning opportunities in the classroom. When the children come through the door ready to settle in, they are usually already checking out what is available to play with as they go wash their hands at the sink. And the teachers? They are ready to extend on the learning that took place the day before, and are on the look-out for the next impromptu learning experience.
