## Teacher's Notes

How Sweet It Is!

I am having a hard time believing that I have been walking through the Berrybrook gate for over twenty years now. When I was first interviewed in the farmhouse to be a teacher here, I had already had some classroom experience in different settings, but Berrybrook felt so *right* that I knew I wanted to be a part of it. One of the aspects that appealed to me was the traditions that have been an integral part of the school for so long. Tree -tapping was one of the mentioned traditions that I personally had no pre-existing knowledge about. The extent of my personal experience was opening up a bottle of prepared syrup and pouring it on my apple pancakes!

I have many warm memories of "learning the Berrybrook way" that first year, but I felt that I was learning about the tree-tapping process right alongside the children. Before the designated day, there was much discussion among the seasoned teachers about what day would be best to officially tap. The weather forecast needed to predict cold nights followed by days that would warm up considerably. Once the perfect stretch of weather was identified, the preparation began. The spickets, buckets, bucket covers, hand drill, and hammer were collected, cleaned, and ready to go.

The teachers planned ways to introduce the children to this experience with props and lesson plans in the classroom including the eye-catching opportunity to have "syrup" in the water table. Real tree stumps were set up in the classrooms with collections of the necessary tools that would help create a visual of what was going to take place outside. The children had time to experience hands-on how the whole process would take place. The classroom activity lent itself to open-ended conversations amongst the students and teachers about new vocabulary (what the heck IS a spicket?), time and patience (how long does it take to fill a bucket with sap?), and a connection with nature (isn't it amazing that a tree can help us make syrup?).

Finally, the big day arrived and all of the classes made the pilgrimage to the Berrybrook maple trees down near what is now the Nook entrance. Mrs. O'Neil showed all the children that were gathered on the ground in front of the trees past tapping holes on the tree that were closing back up and found a good spot to drill. After making a small hole, she carefully tapped a spicket into place along with an attached bucket. All of the children and teachers then waited with held breath for the first sound of the tap, tap, tap of the sap collecting at the bottom of the bucket. Then everyone had a chance to catch a drop of sap falling into the bucket to taste and decide if it tasted like water or syrup. Over the next week or so, the teachers would all help bring in the full buckets of sap to be boiled down. Every time someone would enter the farmhouse, they would be met with a very unique smell in the air and steamed-up windows. Finally, when the syrup was officially done, the classes celebrated with either sugar-on-snow parties or a stack of pancakes. And this year, the tradition will continue - how sweet it is!

# From The Board of Directors

Resiliency, Healing, and the Berrybrook Way

The first several weeks of dropping off my daughter for Beginners class were hard. She and I were so close, and she completely rejected the notion that I had to leave. We would have little conversations about how nice the teachers were, and she would argue, "You're nice too. You stay here." It was not easy. It was hard every day. And every day, my daughter bounced back by pick up time.

In the last couple of months, with my children now in high school, middle school, and the upper elementary school, our family has endured along with other Duxbury and Berrybrook families some really hard times. Most recently, the hoax that led us to believe there was an active shooter at Duxbury High School sent me into a level of adrenaline-overdrive I had never experienced before. It took me a good 36 hours to resume normal function.

It's tempting to say, "Thank goodness, nothing happened," and try to forget about it. In fact, something did happen. Something broke inside of us when we thought our children were under fire. Something broke inside of us when Laney Ladd suddenly died. And something broke inside of us when the Clancy family tragedy came to light.

#### How do we bounce back?

Each of us will find our own path. Some of us were hurt much more deeply by the actual losses of family and friends than others. I don't mean to draw false equivalencies at all, only to say that the impact of these traumatic events has been widespread and deeply felt among our community.

I began by writing about my daughter because it helps me to contemplate how profoundly her entire existence shifted by being separated from me on a regular basis as she began at Berrybrook, how new she was, and how much she was being asked to handle. I am so grateful for the nurturing environment that Berrybrook provided where my daughter could figure out for herself how to bounce back, how to live in her new normal. If only we all could create a more Berrybrook-like world that would support each other through hard times.

Maybe we can. The ingredients are simple: patience, love, kindness, gentle words, laughter, song, healthy snacks. Et voilà! Do you feel a little better already?

Let's remember this spring how everyone is working on their own bounce back, finding their own new normal, and let's extend our Berrybrook way as far as we can reach.
