Teacher's Notes

Making New Friends

"There are no strangers here; only friends you haven't met yet" - William Butler Yeats

Empathy, Loyalty, Trust, Honesty and Respect: 5 virtues we should all strive to embody. While these qualities are arguably the most important to cultivate within yourself to be a good friend; there are many more aspects to maintaining true friendships. Most of all friendships start at school, some come from our jobs and others at social events.

At Berrybrook we start to see friendships forming between the students as young as three years old. Developmentally, the children all start with parallel play - they may play side-by-side without many interactions. Then as the students are ready, they start to learn each other's names. They might find something in common or they comment on each other's clothes or backpacks. Some children have a clear idea by then of who are their friends and can name them. They might look for their friends when they arrive at preschool and play with just them. They might even take interest in having playdates.

Other children at this age might not have a "special" friend in particular or even name all the children in the classroom but they are just as content with playing in a group setting in and out of the classroom.

By four years of age, we start to see children that will tell the difference between "my friend" and other children they know in the classroom. Some children seem to make friends easily and get energy from being around a lot of other people. Others can find this tiring and overwhelming. They might be slower to warm up and need time to watch what happens before joining in with a group.

Children need to learn and practice friendship skills. As children play with others, they build these skills that help them with friendships now and in the future. These are skills like sharing, taking turns, cooperating, listening to others, managing disagreements and being respectful. We encourage and practice all these skills everyday at Berrybrook. Some of the ways we "practice" at Berrybrook is during group time. We will ask the children, "What they think a friend is?" or we ask, "What do friends do for each other?". This provides an open discussion with the children about friendships. Another skill we practice is team building. In our classrooms we provide a variety of blocks and encourage the children to build a tower, castle or even a city. This will give the children an opportunity to work together to build something, take turns, and share ideas.

Preschool is the age at which children start to make friends and build relationships with their peers. We, at Berrybrook know that friendships are important during the early years because this is a time children learn about the 'give and take' of relationships. By sharing experiences, feelings, and interacting with one another, children learn how to meet the social needs of themselves and others.

At Berrybrook we sing a song about friendship with the children entitled "Make New Friends". In the 2 and 3 Day classes we sing this every day at snack time, you might hear your children singing it at home. The older children in the 4/5 day classes also sing this song, but they additionally learn how to include some sign language with the song. It has been a very special song here at Berrybrook for many, many years.

Parent Association Notes


