Teacher's Notes Learning Through the Holidays

Every year I feel like the holidays begin earlier and earlier than the previous year. They creep in and as soon as I see, hear or feel the first sign of the season, I'm all in.

At Berrybrook, this time of year gives us so many wonderful opportunities to combine learning with all the fun the season brings...creativity, language & social skills, fine and gross motor skills, learning how different cultures celebrate and the gift of song to name a few. Here are some examples of how your children learn daily.

How do children learn through making their holiday projects?

They are learning multi-step processes through their project and crafting time. They engage in hands-on learning experiences that differ each day as they learn about different holidays. Cutting, gluing, tracing, painting and drawing all require hand-eye coordination and fine motor skills. They are strengthening the small muscles in their hands and fingers as they write out sing-along invitations and create holiday gifts for their families.

How do children learn through singing holiday songs?

When your child is learning, listening or singing a song, they are developing many areas of their language development. Listening to and singing songs help them with vocabulary building, hearing sentences and repeating patterns, rhyming, how to pronounce words, using their memory with learning new songs. We look forward to sharing our gift of song with all of you at our sing-alongs.

How do children learn through reading and listening to holidays stories?

Children enjoy us reading holiday themed books to them through the month of December. This sparks interest and questions about how families celebrate different holidays. The children hear new words and expand their vocabulary and comprehension skills. New concepts are talked about and they get excited to hear their favorites stories.

How do children learn at gather time during the holidays?

The children enjoy learning about each other's holiday traditions during our gather time. We ask them what traditions their families enjoy each year. This is a really neat way for each child to learn and understand that everyone celebrates in their own way. Some similar and some different, but they all celebrate. They ask questions and listen to all the great ideas given and may hear something that they want to start as a new tradition within their family.

How do children learn in the housekeeping area during the holidays?

We fill our housekeeping area with many festive holiday themed items during December. The placemats, dishes, dress up, etc...all allow the children to get involved in planning and setting up for family to gather together. They enjoy setting up the table to fit more than their own immediate family and dressing up to host. They plan parties and hand out invitations for all to enjoy celebrating together. They are learning through their own traditions.

I hope these explanations brings you more understanding to what goes on within all of our classrooms at Berrybrook during the month of December. We enjoy teaching your children all the wonderful gifts the holidays give to us. Family, traditions, memories, celebrating what is important to us and the joy of being together with our loved ones.

Colder weather is on its way...

It is our policy to cancel classes whenever Duxbury Public Schools are closed due to weather emergencies. Families should watch Channel 7, WHDH for a school cancellation at Berrybrook. Every attempt at notification will be made through email messages, text messages, phone calls via OneCallNow and/or social media.

In the event Duxbury Public Schools require a one hour delay, Berrybrook will have the usual 9am arrival time.

***<u>In the event Duxbury Public Schools require a two hour delay, the AM session</u> will be cancelled. ***

Beyond a formal cancellation, we urge parents to use their best judgment about driving young children to school in inclement weather.

As the weather changes, be sure to dress children appropriately for outdoor play, including the Nook. Now is a good time to locate all hats, mittens, gloves, and warm jackets that will be necessary as we head into December. Once the snow flies, children should bring snow pants and snow boots. Children are welcome to change into slippers, sneakers, or crocs at school to make sure they are comfortable in the classroom.
